

SMILEY'S BOLINAS

On Feb. 6, 1824, a Coastal Miwok insurgent named Pomponio was executed by firing squad in Monterey for his crimes of "mayhem and murder." Born near today's town of Bolinas, Pomponio was the leader of Los Insurgentes, a band of Native Americans who rebelled against Mexican rule and "terrorized" missions up and down the coast. After killing a Mexican soldier, Pomponio fled to Marin County, where Mexican military captured him north of San Rafael. Unsubstantiated lore has it that while imprisoned in Monterey, he amputated his own heel to escape his shackles. Pomponio State Beach south of Half Moon Bay bears his name.








St. Aidan's Family Service:


In addition to poisoning snails, slugs and earwigs (bad luck for the birds), trays of rat poison outside in any kind of accessible container will affect rodents, but it can also decimate ALL the beneficial native predators that help keep nature in relative balance.

Please Google: "marijuana-rodenticides" to see how devastating; Google again, for non-toxic alternatives for rodent control.

It only takes one in a neighborhood to kill off all the owls – those that can help the most. A family of Barn Owls can consume upwards of 3000 rodents a year, and once the predators are gone, all everyone is left with are traps and more poison. Let's work together to preserve our natural environment, the joys of country living and the reasons we all moved here.




We only drive past there on our way to the Palomarin parking lot at Point Reyes National Seashore.

Titular poems

Sorted Books

By Nina Katchadourian
(Chronicle Books;
176 pages; \$22.95)

Everyone with a personal library must have had the fantasy of finding that titles on adjacent books' spines have by chance generated some new thought or poetic declaration.

New York conceptual artist Nina Katchadourian first took this dream into her own hands 20 years ago, as a UC San Diego art student enjoying a one-week residency at a private home in Half Moon Bay. Challenged to make new work using only the contents of the household, she turned to the

many books on hand and began making the kind of arrangements documented in "Sorted Books."

For such an obvious idea, Katchadourian's process — which others have taken up since (and probably had before) — frequently yields strikingly funny results, while

able not only tested Katchadourian's ingenuity, it heightens our attention to our own nimbleness in making something out of little or nothing. Some examples are haiku simile: "Paradise/Extra Innings/After Death." Others ignite almost cinematic imagination: "A Day at the Beach/The Bath-ers/Shark 1/Shark 2/Shark 3/Sudden Violence/Silence."

Of course we can do this sort of thing in our heads, but the accidents of real books' condition, size and design add a traction and surprise that only their physical reality, seemingly so jeopardized by the digital tsunami, can provide.



Into The Wake Of The Quake

Two years ago this month, an earthquake measuring 9.0 on the Richter scale off the northeastern coast of Japan unleashed the energy of 600 million Hiroshima bombs, followed by massive seismic tidal waves. The world's media reported intently on the resulting destruction, especially since it triggered the meltdown of a nuclear power plant. Then international attention moved on, but Gretel Ehrlich chose to go to the heart, both physically and emotionally, of what became "a wild place of total devastation," where one hundred years of modernization seem to have been erased in one afternoon.

Ehrlich, renowned author of fifteen books of nature writing, fiction, poetry and more, was no stranger to Japan, having spent much time there since childhood. One of her most famous books details her experience of being struck by lightning. But nothing could have really prepared her for what she witnessed in the months following the "Three sorrows: quake, tsunami, meltdown." Traveling widely with local people through the most-impacted areas, she gives voice to over thirty local survivors — fisherman, farmers, Buddhist priests and nuns, families ripped apart and decimated. Entire villages, including schools, hospitals, factories — everything — were swept away. Bodies were found in trees and hand stuck up out of mud. Hungry, cold — it was snowing that horrible day — the surviving "internal refugees" were left to wander and attempt to piece lives together while searching for corpses to burn and mourn in "a world of lost lives, illegible debris, and sorrow."

Simultaneously, "the worst maritime contamination disaster in recorded history" was underway at the Fukushima Daiichi nuclear plant, with over 200,000 surviving residents evacuated. The extent of the radiation and risk and quality of the response were — and are — debated, and will take decades to truly determine. But for many at ground zero, that unknown cloud results in what feels like "a futureless future."

The overwhelming tragedy, perhaps unsurprisingly, brings out both the best and worst in people. Looting and fraud occur, but from Ehrlich's reportage, many more people respond with self-sacrifice in helping others. People tell of many large and small efforts to feed and comfort others, even when they have little to nothing to give. Monks begged for funds and baked bread to take to the disaster zone; temples and homes became shelters and morgues. Older men volunteered to work at the reactor to spare the young. Many risked their own health to rescue lost animals. Ehrlich strives to record it all and to make sense of the human dynamic: "To say that the tsunami survivors' attitude towards their tremendous loss is stoicism would be to underestimate the complexity of their response. Courage and self-discipline are evident everywhere...but the pain of loss is staggering; there's confusion, nightmarish fear, and there are suicides."

Yet Ehrlich, who stayed in Japan for nine months, finds and ends on notes of perseverance and hope. "We've been laughing a lot — I don't know why" marvels a Buddhist abbot's wife, who lost and suffered much. "The tsunami is past. We must think about the future," the abbot himself counsels. As Ehrlich concludes, "We can see the pain of loss and swing the other way, encountering the unexpected joy of survival." Her own account in this brief but unforgettable book is itself a heartrending and unexpected marvel. ¥¥







a shattering of intent.


somewhere I follow
