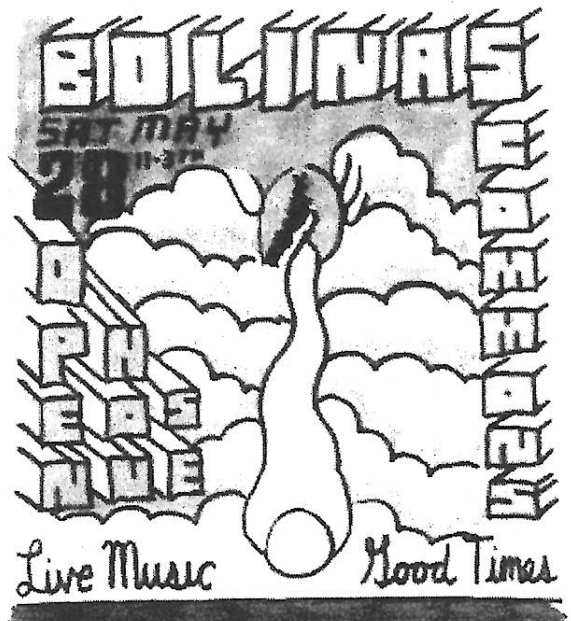

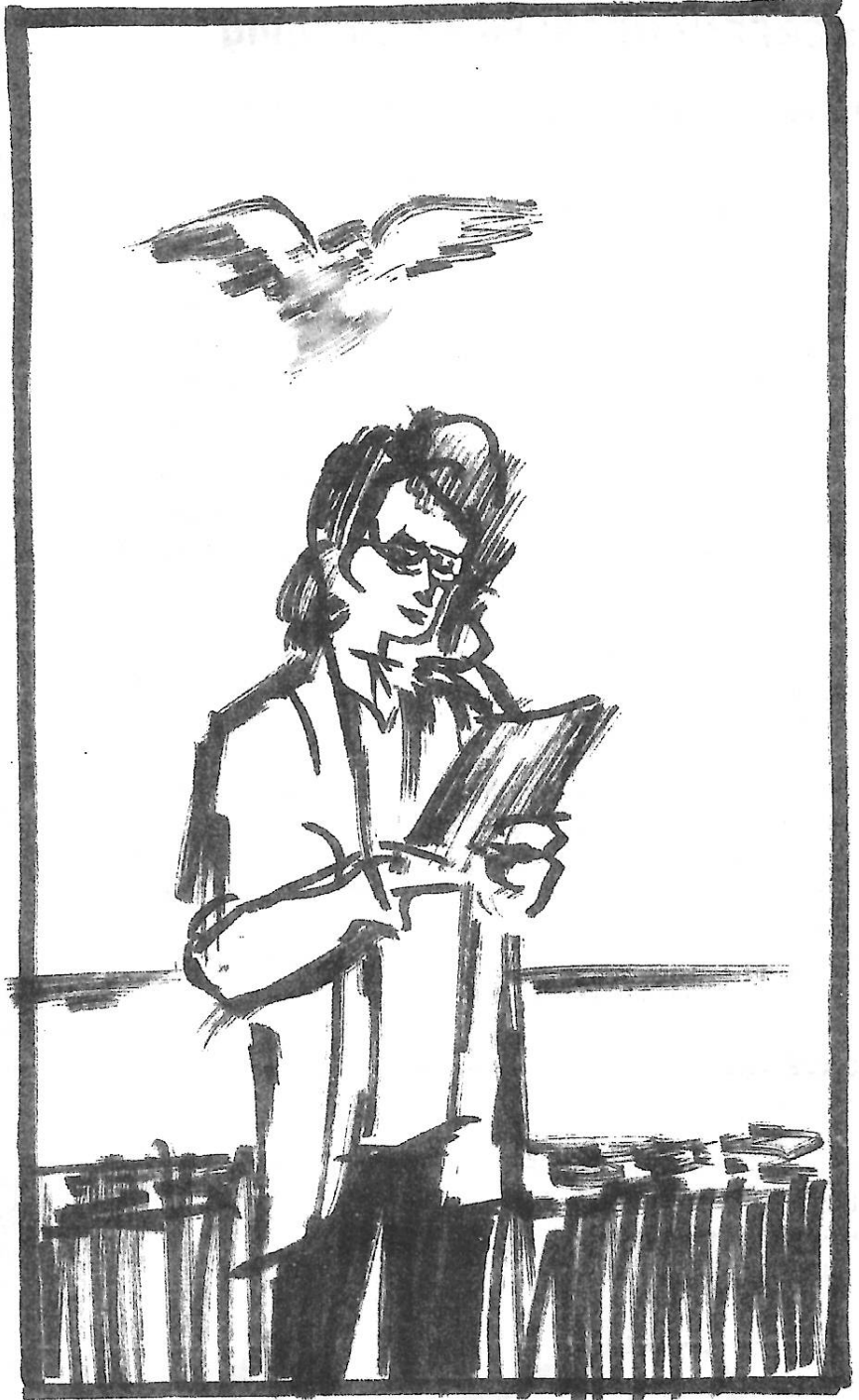

Dear Friends,

We have spent the past fourteen years growing and cultivating Point Reyes Books. The experience has enriched our lives far more than we could have anticipated when Steve had the crazy notion of purchasing an existing bookstore in 2002. We were retail novices then, without even a basic knowledge of how to operate a small business. As we've learned and grown, we have indeed felt blessed.

But for a while now, we've been pondering the question posed by poet Mary Oliver in "The Summer Day." She wrote, "Tell me, what is it you plan to do with your one wild and precious life?" After months of deep discernment on how we want to write our next chapter, we've concluded that the bookstore can no longer be at the center, and we've made the difficult decision to sell the business.

In the store's early years, we quickly found that we loved selling books with all of our hearts, both the top new reads and important new and used books not found elsewhere. Eventually we realized we also wanted to create a special "community living room" within our extraordinary West Marin physical landscape. We have tried to weave Point Reyes Books into the fabric of everyday life here—making connections between people, supporting local nonprofit organizations, being part of the downtown business network, and nurturing new ideas. We are very proud of what we've been able to accomplish.

Over this time, we've been enormously inspired by writers who have visited us here at the shop—like Isabel Allende, Robert Reich, Rick Bass, Cheryl Strayed, Michael Pollan, Gary Snyder, and Terry Tempest Williams, to name a few. In fact, we've hosted more than 800 author readings and conversations grounded in community, spirit, story, and place. We've raised more than \$550,000 for local nonprofits at benefit events. We've co-published the *West Marin Review* literary journal and presented six inspiring Geography of Hope literary conferences. Most recently, we convened the sold-out conference, *Call of the Forest: Water, Climate & Spirit*.

None of this have we done alone. Our incredible staff is like family. Each contributes unique experiences, voices, and skills in support of education, conversation, and inspiration. Dawn Steiner, Helen Strodl, and Lisa Doron have lovingly taken care of the store and us, and have contributed as much as we have to its ultimate success.

While we're not totally sure what's next for us, we do know we want to have more time to be in nature with family and friends, and we want to put our energies toward building a better future world for all, including our three grandchildren.

We want to grow our spiritual lives, serve the poor, and explore the world outside of West Marin. Steve wants to continue to create events and retreats through our newly established nonprofit, *Black Mountain Circle*. Kate wants to expand her *Emotional Currency* work and write another book.

We also know we'd like the bookstore to continue to serve the community and carry on

Farmstand Show

Yesterday I took a second look at the current show at the Farmstand where Arline Mathieu and Tim Burns are sharing the gallery.

Arline is showing watercolors and Tim is showing photographs and together they call their show "Conversations: Harmony of Change."

Their artist statement sums up the show: "Although the two artists approach their work differently (Tim capturing with his camera an observable world, Arline presenting an imagined universe) both present phenomena as ever changing worlds, fleeting and fragile in nature."

Arline's watercolors reflect her 40 year Buddhist practice. Her paintings depict ethereal, floating worlds - radiant orbs of imagination. A painting like "Beading a Monkish Sky" is a lyrical interpretation of deep meditation.

"I'm inspired by hearing about water on Mars and the moons of Venus." Arline told me. "My paintings are like telescopes, and also microscopes."

Tim Burns looks for natural abstractions in his photographs. This series is like looking through a steamed up window. The dew drops and rivulets of moisture obscure and abstract the view beyond.

Sometimes the abstraction is painterly, as in "Dreamscape" Sometimes the result is ghostly, as in "A Winter's Tale" Sometimes it's amorphous as in "Luminosity of Being" and sometimes it's dark and mysterious as in "The Magic of Rothko"

Tim's photographs and Arline's paintings are best when savored thoughtfully. Dewdrops and floating worlds are wonderful food for thought, if time is taken for consideration. Fortunately the Farmstand is like an oasis of cultural sanity.

This is the last weekend of their show. Stop by the Farmstand. Check out the Art and pick up some produce and fresh eggs.
