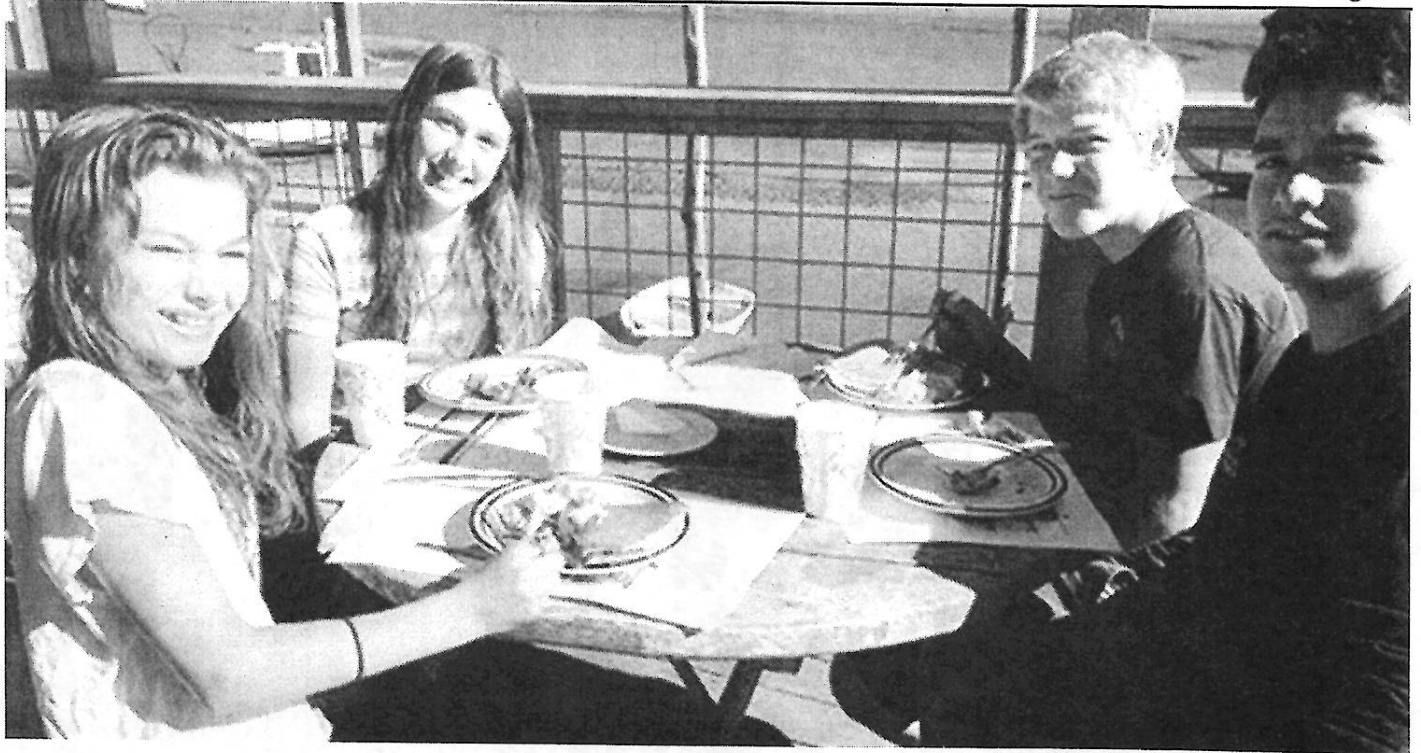

Bill Berkson, San Francisco poet, art critic and teacher, dies

Bill Berkson, a prolific San Francisco poet who also forged a career as an art critic and beloved teacher, has died.

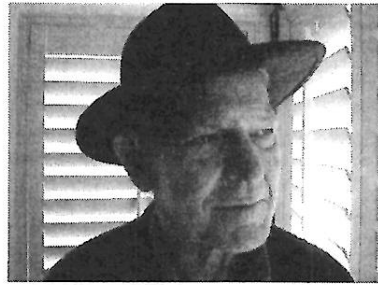
Mr. Berkson suffered a heart attack Thursday morning, said his stepdaughter, Nina Lewallen. He was 76.

Linked to the New York School of poets and artists, Mr. Berkson collaborated with Frank O'Hara, Ron Padgett, Anne Waldman, Bernadette Mayer and Philip Guston, among others. He wrote more than 20 collections of poetry, beginning with "Saturday Night: Poems 1960-61," published in 1961. His most recent book, a travel journal titled "Invisible Oligarchs: Russia Notebook, January-June 2006 & After," was published this year.

"Bill Berkson affords the pleasures of raucous refinement and epigrammatic élan in lyrics, translations, gleanings, and reflections," wrote Charles Bernstein in his review of Mr. Berkson's "Expect Delays." "Like dissolving into a '40s movie or then again a dream of a conversation about new art and old jazz standards, these poems are sad and wise."

Professor emeritus at the San Francisco Art Institute, where he taught art history, critical writing and poetry from 1984 to 2008, Mr. Berkson regularly wrote reviews for prominent art journals, including Art News and Artforum. His critical work appeared in "The Sweet Singer of Modernism and Other Art Writings 1985-2003" and "Sudden Address: Selected Lectures 1981-2006."

In an interview last year with the Brooklyn Rail, he said, "Art is not just a social proposition, but an ethical proposition that involves ethical choices, therefore the proper response to the work



of art — whether it's any good or not, or whether you like it — has to do with whether you think it is right or not."

Mr. Berkson was born in New York City in 1939; his parents were Seymour Berkson, publisher of the New York Journal-American, and Eleanor Lambert, a fashion publicist. He grew to love poetry when enrolled in Kenneth Koch's class at the New School for Social Research in 1959. Thanks to Koch, Mr. Berkson came to know O'Hara, James Schuyler and other poets of the New York School.

He moved to the Bay Area in 1970, teaching in the California Poets in the Schools program.

Mr. Berkson is survived by his wife, curator Constance Lewallen; son Moses Berkson and daughter Siobhan O'Hare Mora Lopez, from his first marriage, to Lynn O'Hare Berkson; stepchildren Jonathan Lewallen and Nina Lewallen Hufford; and six grandchildren.

His family said memorial services will be held in San Francisco and New York.

Local Wayne Belles dies at 69

Steve Hill called the Hearsay News on Friday and told me that a local, Wayne Belles had recently died. Steve said that they had become friends years ago when he had camped with Wayne. He asked that we share some of Wayne's past.

Wayne was a German orphan who was adopted by an American Air Force colonel. He spent his childhood in Germany, Tunisia, Texas, and then Novato where he attended high school with Big Rick and Russ Riviere. He played varsity football and attended Demo Lay (a young man's Masonic organization).

At 18 he moved to Hawaii to ride the big waves.

Wayne was drafted in 1968 and joined the Navy where he served on a Float Ship during the Viet Nam war as a Navy foreman doing medical work. He also worked at Marin general.

Steve recalled that Wayne moved to Bolinas in the 1990s.

At the time of his death, Wayne was living in his truck.

There will be a memorial in early July.

Zika, Family Planning, & the Helms Amendment

In countries where mosquitoes are spreading the Zika virus, it can be terrifying to be pregnant. Millions of women in Latin America and the Caribbean still have an unmet need for family planning. In several countries where Zika is active (the Dominican Republic, El Salvador, Haiti, Honduras, Nicaragua and Suriname) abortion is a crime, often punishable by long term imprisonment.

Even in countries where abortion is legal in cases of rape, incest, or threats to the life or health of the woman, U.S. aid has been blocked by the Helms Amendment. This policy was passed as an amendment to the Foreign Assistance Act in 1973 as part of a wave of anti-abortion backlash to the Roe v. Wade Supreme Court decision of the same year. It states that 'No foreign assistance funds may be used to pay for the performance of abortion as a method of family planning or to motivate or coerce any person to practice abortions.'

Both Secretary Clinton (and Senator Sanders) have committed to fix Helms after taking the presidential oath of office. President Obama has failed to do so thus far. U.S. aid to family planning could be helpful in many developing countries in Latin America, Asia and Africa.

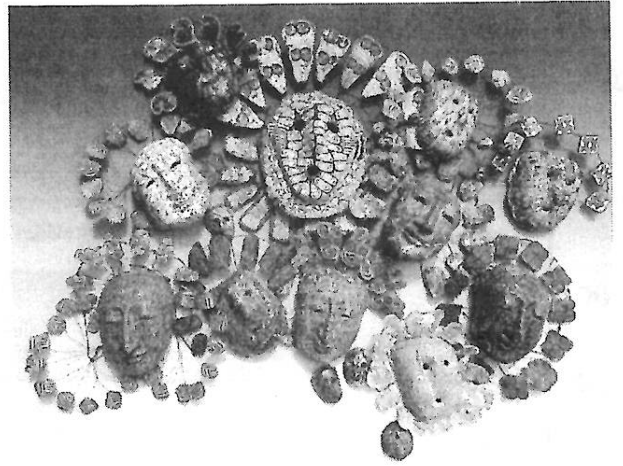
According to Global Planned Parenthood, One in three women in the world will experience violence in her lifetime, many before the age of 18. In some countries that figure can be as high as 70%. High rates of violence contribute to unintended pregnancy, complications in pregnancy, unsafe abortion, and maternal deaths in parts of the world where health systems remain weak and women and communities lack access to quality care.

Rates of gender-based violence are especially high in areas of conflict and crisis, where rape is used as a tool of war, and in displaced communities such as refugee camps. Young women are particularly vulnerable to both violence and unintended pregnancy, which forces many of them to give up school or become mothers before they are ready.

Worldwide, there are more than 20 million unsafe abortions every year that lead to millions of injuries and 22,000 deaths.

Here's some better news: the percentage of pregnancies that are unintended is falling in the U.S. Data from the US Centers for Disease Control found that the proportion of pregnancies in the United States that were unintended dropped from 51% of all pregnancies between 2006 to 2010 to 45% between 2009 and 2013.. Researchers consider a pregnancy to be unintended if a woman said she never wanted to have a child or did not want to have a child yet.

Here's a new trend in birth control availability: women are now going to special apps on their phones to ask for the pill or some other hormonal methods without a doctor's visit. They are interviewed online or by video, and the pills are sent by mail. Planned

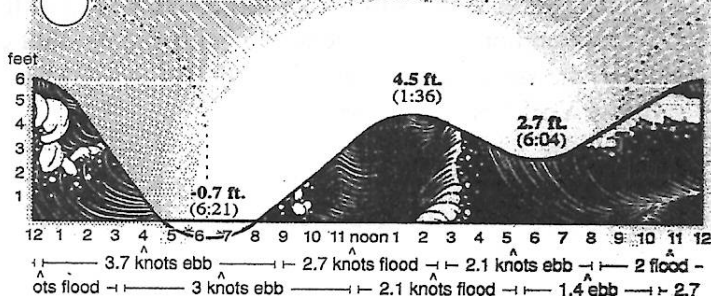

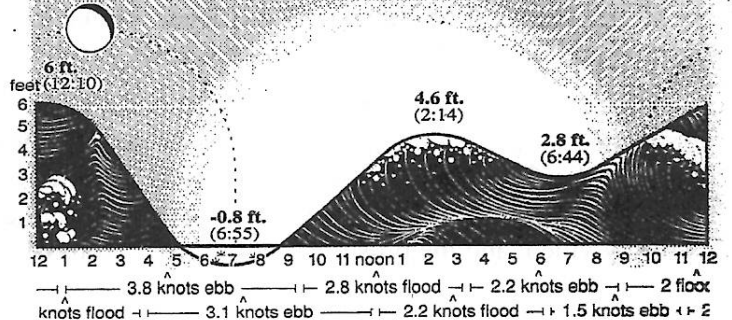

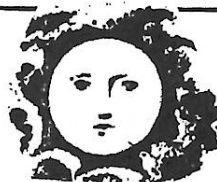
