Mayan Prophecy Wheel

A number of years ago I made a Mayan Fortune Wheel to include in my collection of wheels. I painted 20 Mayan glyphs in a big circle.

I brought the Mayan wheel to the Gallery to celebrate 2012. I happened to run into Camila Martinez in the Plaza and I invited her to the event. She told me that she had just returned from Guatemala where she had been working with the Maya around Lake Atitlan to preserve heirloom seeds (The Maya Seed Ark Project.)

Camila said that she would be happy to speak about the Maya and help us interpret the glyphs on the wheel. On Friday we met at the Gallery.

Camila said that certain Maya are called the "day keepers" and it is their responsibility to perform the proper ceremonies for each day.

The 20 day glyphs are arranged in 13 "months" to make up the Mayan 260 day calendar. Each day has its own color and its own watchwords.

We took turns spinning the Mayan Fortune Wheel. Camila interpreted each glyph by translating from a book in Spanish.

The readings were instructions in how to perform on the day the glyph signified. To the Maya every day has significance and requires special ceremony.

I liked the idea of special ceremony and color for each day. I thought about a sign that would show the daily word and daily color.

Compassion - blue

I also thought about synchronicity as I watched the Mayan Fortune wheel spin in the Gallery. Maybe synchronicity, or meaningful coincidence, is a way for the universe to express itself.

I thought about an artmaking machine that would use synchronicity to arrange symbols in a meaningful way.

Wait a minute,

I'm that machine.

Drake Jordan

Two weeks ago Drake Jordan died at the age of 77. Drake devoted a lot of time and energy to Bolinas during the 60's and 70's..

In 1968 Drake quit his job with the City of Oakland. With \$1200 from his pension fund he moved his wife, Helen, and two sons, Curtis and Eric to Bolinas.

He immediately joined the activists who were trying to save the lagoon and the town from developers.

He helped with the founding of the Hearsay News by bringing the multilith printing press to town.

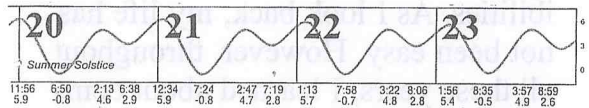
Drake had his own graphic design firm and taught graphic design and drawing at City College for 29 years.

He also painted visionary art in acrylics and had a couple of shows in San Francisco. He received a good review from Thomas Albright, but didn't push his art.

In 1998 Drake and Helen moved to Duncan Mills. Drake loved the ocean and the house was on the Russian River only two miles from the ocean.

Drake told his wife, "No need for burial for me. Just dump my body in the river and it will carry me out to sea."

The Dalai Lama was the spiritual leader of Tibet until he, and 100,000 of his subjects fled to safety in 1959 when the Chinese violently overtook their country. They settled in India where His Holiness established a Democratic form of government. (I can only imagine the kind of fear and terror he must have experienced during that horrible time in his life, yet he has become one of the world's greatest spiritual teachers on peace and non-violence!... Mary The following are words from His Holiness, The Dalai Lama; excerpts from his book, "An Open Heart".....

"At the age of sixteen I lost my freedom, and at twenty four I lost my country. I have been a refugee for the past forty years, with heavy responsibilities. As I look back, my life has not been easy. However, throughout all these years, I learned about compassion, about caring for others. This mental attitude has brought me inner strength. One of my favorite prayers is:

So long as space remains, So long as sentient beings remain, I will remain, In order to help, in order to serve, In order to make my own contribution.

That sort of thinking brings one inner strength and confidence. It has brought purpose to my life. No matter how difficult or complicated things may be, if we have this type of mental attitude, we can have mental peace."

"Spiritual growth need not be based on religious faith, let us speak of secular ethics.

I believe that the methods by which we increase our altruism, our sense of caring for others and developing the attitude that

our own individual concerns are less important than those of others, are common to all major religious traditions. Though we may find differences in philosophical views and rites, the essential message of all religions is very much the same. They all advocate love, compassion and forgiveness. And even those who do not believe in religion can appreciate the virtues of basic human values.

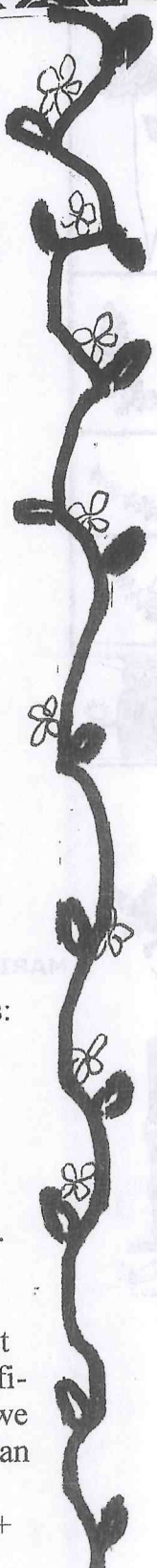
Since our very existence and well-being are a result of the cooperation and contributions of countless others, we must develop a proper attitude about the way we relate to them. We often tend to forget this basic fact. Today, in our modern global economy, national boundaries are irrelevant. Not only do countries depend upon one another, but so do continents. We are heavily interdependent."

"Nonviolence does not mean that we remain indifferent to a problem. On the contrary, it is important to be fully engaged. However we must behave in a manner that does not benefit us alone. We must not harm the interests of others. Non-violence therefore is not merely the absence of violence. It involves a sense of compassion and caring.. It is almost a manifestation of compassion. I strongly believe that we must promote such a concept of nonviolence at the level of the family as well as at the national and international levels. Each individual has the ability to contribute to such compassionate nonviolence."

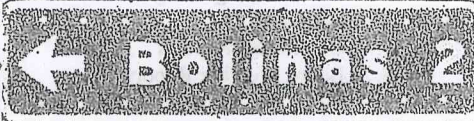

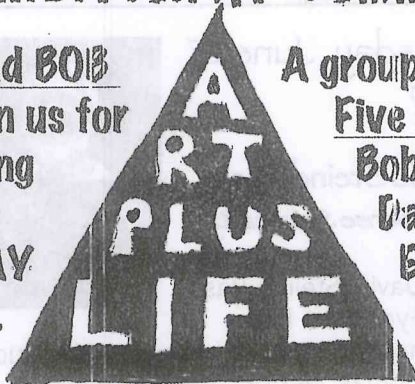

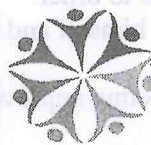

Bolinas man sues state, claiming a deer hurt him

A Bolinas man who says he was attacked by a deer has filed a lawsuit against the state Department of Fish and Game, claiming it "mismanaged" the animal.

Tadeusz Wyrzykowski, in a handwritten court filing, says the deer jumped into his fenced yard last spring and "attacked me (twice) on a narrow path."

"I fell into a window pane," he wrote. "A shred of glass imbedded [sic] in my right foot."

Wyrzykowski, who lives on Aspen Road, said the wildlife department "owns that animal, manages it and is responsible for the diversified use of it."

"CDFG mismanaged negligently its animal its claims & duties," he said. "As a direct result, I suffered trauma, pain and lasting injury, compromising my health till present."

Wyrzykowski, 58, seeks unspecified damages. A case management conference was set for Oct. 19 before Judge Roy Chernus in Marin Superior Court.

Jordan Traverso, a spokeswoman for the Department of Fish and Game, said the agency has not seen the lawsuit, and in any case does not comment on pending litigation.

Last year, Wyrzykowski filed a federal lawsuit against several officials in the Marin County Assessor-Recorder's Office, claiming civil rights violations, intentional infliction of emotional distress and other allegations. The handwritten lawsuit was over the county's efforts to collect overdue property taxes on several parcels Wyrzykowski owns in Bolinas.

Describing himself as an "independent dignity ambassador" and "orator/scholar/artist," he said the officials should be "persecuted" for supporting a culture of corruption and fraud in the tax office, and said the officials "hippocritically broke the laws they preached."

Deputy County Counsel Edward Kiernan asked the judge to dismiss the suit, saying it was full of "nonsensical, irrelevant non sequiturs" and "legally meaningless and pointless facts."

"In short, his complaint represents an enormous waste of time and resources, both his and those of Defendant Marin County, and now the Court's," Kiernan wrote.

U.S. District Judge Susan Illston dismissed the suit.

10:10 a.m. meeting called to order.

Chris Beseny introduced himself and his interest in joining the board.

Minutes for the April meeting approved. Agenda amended.

President's report: StuArt leads us in the mission statement song. *Bolinas Community Center, Bolinas Community Center, our mission is to foster, inclusive community participation, by providing an environmentally, sound facility, for arts – education, recreation, celebration, and locally based human services, in order to increase, opportunity – for personal and collective growth, in our community.*

Art and Garden was a fantastic event that took an amazing amount of work.

Treasurer's report: We read through Budget vs. actual. Income is higher than estimated in the budget, which is good but we are still operating on a very small margin.

Development Director report: Randi informed us of her research into business rentals in Bolinas, which is about \$2/sq. ft. and that the library is now paying about 80¢. She will try to negotiate a higher rate for our upcoming 5-year lease.

Manager's report: Lia thanked everyone for their hard work at Art & Garden. Next year we need to work harder on publicity, banners and signs, and an e-mail campaign might help to bring a higher attendance. At the moment we've taken in about \$7400 gross and made about \$5,000 with still a few more auction items to be paid for. Everyone agreed how much we enjoyed having live chickens in the Center.

There are now curtains over the kitchen doors to help with noise and smells from the kitchen during classes, and some new racks were gotten from the Blue Heron sale.

The plans for the new stove is under way. The major hurdle is the need for a new hood, which will cost about \$4,000. With the surrounding costs, and new sink we will need about \$10,000. The kitchen committee includes StuArt, Serita, Randi, and Lia and are already discussing Wine & Food fundraisers. There might be a County Block grant available, and we will pursue individual donations of money or items for the kitchen.

Plans for Memorial Day are discussed, music will be co-ordinated by StuArt and Maji. Drakes Bay oyster and Lagunitas beer donations are under way. Randi will be away for Memorial Day and 2 weeks surrounding it.

Other business: Discussion about parking on the garage side of the building, and the importance of clear communication with our neighbors.

A conversation about possible Saturday morning meeting places or other times for meeting

ensued as the Library is now open on Saturday mornings.

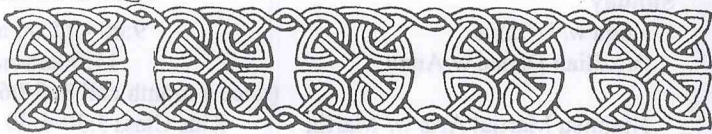

The artists and curators will be present.

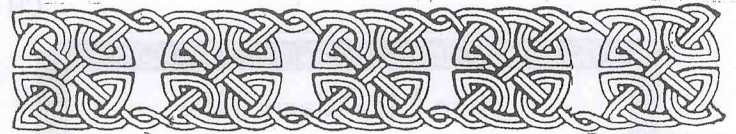
