NEW SECRETS OF THE UNIVERSE

Physicists Nearer to Verifying A Key Clue To Universe

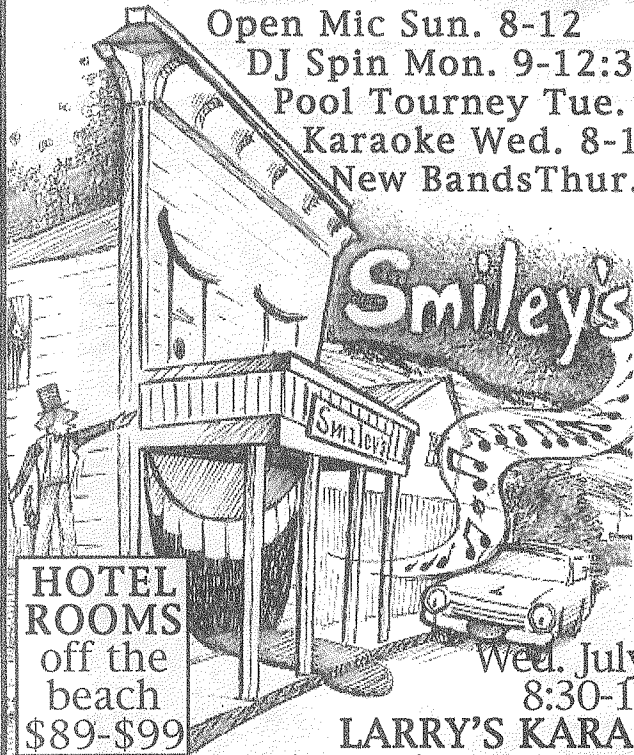

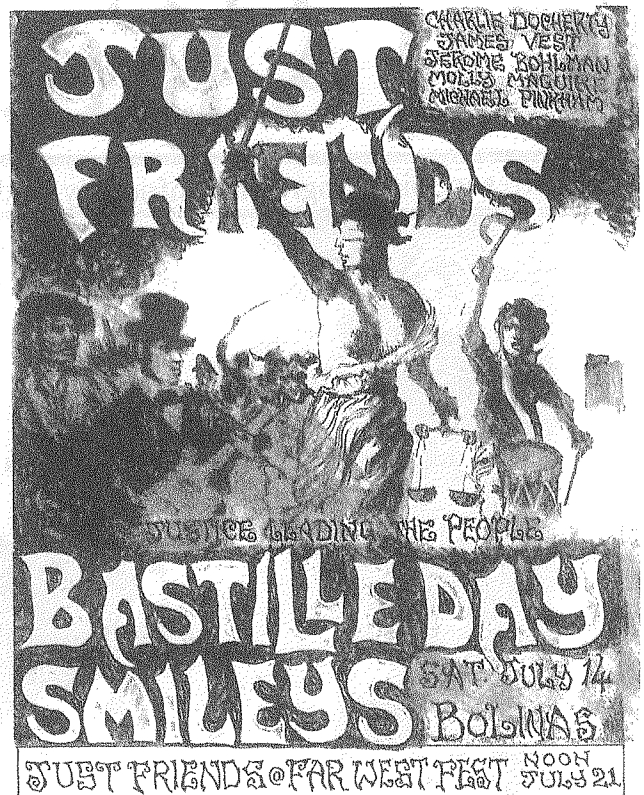

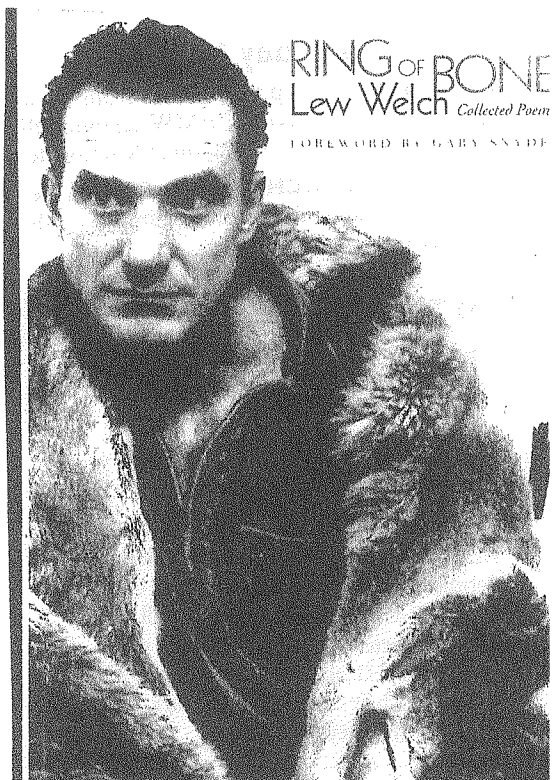

Lew Welch was a brilliant poet, legendary among his Beat peers. He disappeared in 1971, leaving a suicide note behind. Ring of Bone collects poems, songs, and even a few drawings, documenting the full sweep of his creative output, from his early years until just before his death. First published by legendary poetry editor Donald Allen, this new and expanded edition includes a biographic timeline and a statement of poetics gleaned from Welch's own writing.

Gary Snyder is a poet who was associated with the Beat Generation and the San Francisco Renaissance in his early years. He is also known as an essayist, environmental activist, post-humanist scholar, long-time student of East Asian and Native American cultures, and practicing Buddhist. Snyder has translated from literary Chinese and modern Japanese. For many years, Snyder served as a faculty member at the University of California, Davis, and was on the board of the California Arts Council in the seventies. He lives in a hand-built house in the northern California Sierra. Snyder was a close friend of Lew Welch, and Lew was camping on Snyder's land in the mountains when he chose to disappear.

In addition, Joanne Kyger, whose powerful poetic life started in the company of Snyder, Welch, and Philip Whalen, and Tom Killion, who long studied Lew's life and works, will pay tribute to Lew.

This event will be held in the Koret Auditorium of the San Francisco Public Library's main branch.

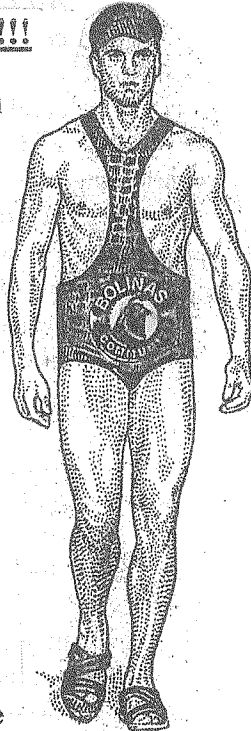

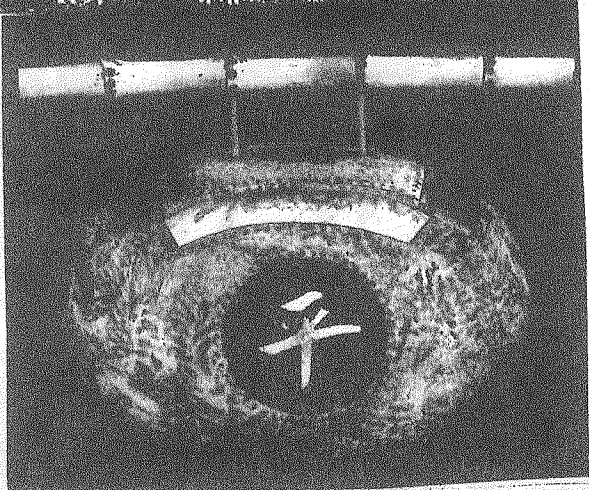

FOUR STRESS RELIEVERS

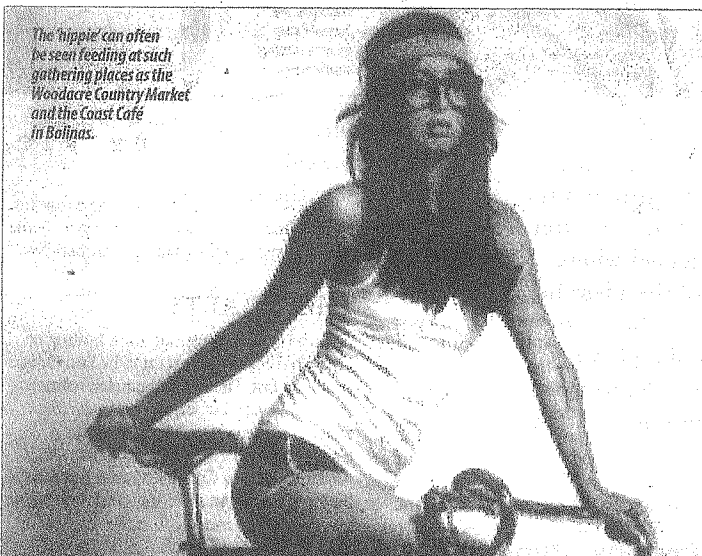
1. Get up 15 minutes earlier in the morning. The inevitable morning mishaps will be less stressful.

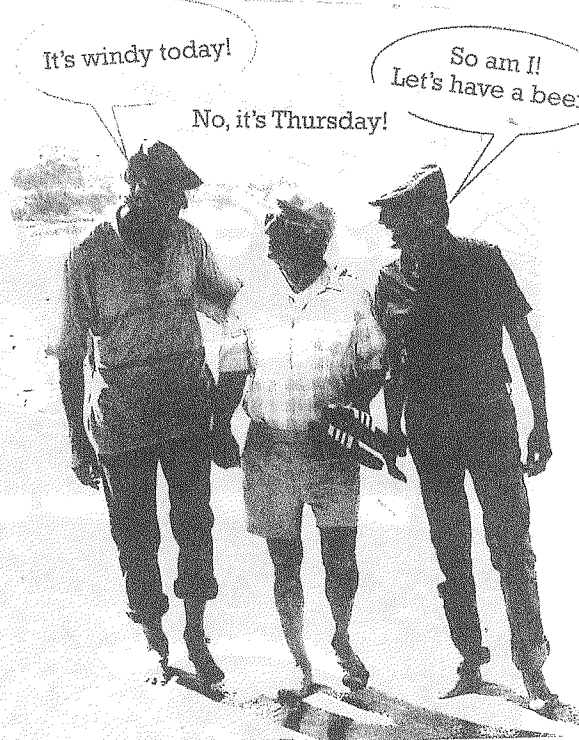

CONFESSIONS
OF AN ACCIDENTAL
COMMONWEALER

I was first aware of Commonweal as an interloper who camped there against the rules due to the waves down the cliffs. This was decades ago when I was a graduate student in public health and had no idea what the funky old buildings were used for; I just knew it was one of the most beautiful spots I'd ever seen.

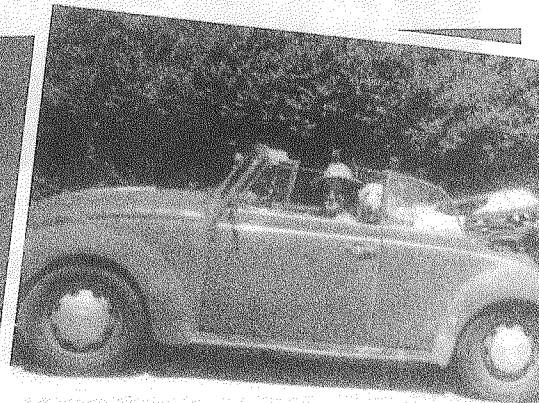
Then in the mid-1980s I read a profile of Commonweal and its co-founder Michael Lerner in the *Pacific Sun*, a local weekly paper. The accompanying photograph of Lerner, sitting on his vintage Volkswagen bug, only heightened my feeling that this was a guy who had his priorities right—and good taste too (although my bug, a convertible, was even cooler).

Years later the *San Francisco Chronicle* asked me to review a book, titled *Choices in Healing*, on complementary approaches to cancer. I didn't know the book was by Michael Lerner until it arrived. My review appeared in the Sunday paper. On Monday my phone rang and it was Lerner. In my experience, authors rarely get in touch unless they are upset. Michael expressed thanks, which was a relief. Then he seemingly innocently asked, "So, what else do you do?"

I told him of my work as a public health advocate, researcher, ethicist, and editor, and added, "plus I sometimes sleep illegally near your office and pan-handle you for spare change in downtown Bolinas—not that you ever give me anything." He laughed at the lame joke and said we had to meet. Soon we were working together on environmentally-responsible healthcare, reducing the overuse of antibiotics in confined animal feeding operations, and more.

The most intensive involvement I have with Commonweal is with the Collaborative on Health and the Environment (CHE). In 2001, after a beach walk with Michael where we hashed out some of the ideas he had obviously been brewing for some time, we had enough of a plan to attract funding and people, to bring together scientists, patients, clinicians,

environmentalists, and others with the common intent of furthering progress in the broad field of environmental health. We now have thousands of Partners from around the globe, hold world-class conferences, have working groups on a wide array of topics, continue to present online conference calls, and much more. CHE thrives, ten years old and robust.

Commonweal remains a unique, wonderful place to work. I've avoided a litany of names here, as there are too many great people to acknowledge. The number of people now working at Commonweal is double what it was when I first signed on over a decade ago. But I do feel compelled to note the very significant arrival of our Executive Director Susan Braun. Her warm professionalism and wisdom has, I believe, given everybody here confidence in Commonweal's future. Susan showed up at precisely the right time.

As for surfers or others seeking to camp on the grounds, I now feel a twinge of hypocrisy when we kick them out. I probably should ask them, "So, what else do you do?" After all, one never knows. ■

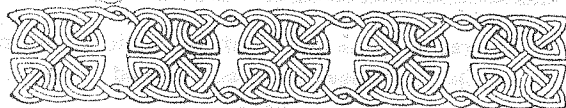
