Whale Blues

Forty years ago, undergoing Jungian analysis after the failure of my first marriage in London, I had a series of dreams in which I encountered a whale and it looked closely at me..... Neither the therapist.nor I were ever able to articulate what this meant but it remains one of the most profound experiences of my life.

So I was excited when I heard that a Blue Whale had been seen floating off Bolinas; the small N. Californian coastal town I have lived in for 35 years. The name Bolinas, according to some local historians may be a corruption of the Portugese word for whales: "baulenes" certainly sounds the same but it also may be a word from the now extinct Coastal Miwok natives who lived here when the first Spanish/Mexican family of Gregorio Briones obtained the land grant from the King of Spain for this area in the 1820s.

Every year in January the whales can be seen from the tip of the Point Reyes Peninsula as they migrate south to breed in the Sea of Cortez. But these are usually Grey whales, or, rarely, Humpbacks. The Blue Whale is not often seen unless from a boat far out to sea at the Farallon Islands or beyond.

The Blue Whale that floated in on a very high tide Wednesday night crossed Duxbury Reef and now rests at the foot of the eroding cliffs below Poplar Road. It is a known individual; a young female identified by her unique fluke pattern in 1999 and seen at least 11 times since, twice with calves, mostly in the Santa Barbara Channel. She could have lived another 60 years or more......

On Saturday morning May 27th, 2017, about 40 marine biologists, led by teams from the California Academy of Science and the Marin Marine Mammal Center, performed a necropsy on the dead whale. The removed her eye, pelvis, parts of her ear, and many other tissue and organ samples. This will help to know more about these largest of all Earth creatures, as not that much is known now. I watched as the biologists carved her up and I have never seen so many happy scientists.... Most were women and seemed to be very efficient about the tasks.



Board of Supervisors Hearing on Short Term Rentals (STR) Tues July 18

Dear Community,

West Marin Homes for Locals met Monday night to hash out our main points we want to put forward at next Tuesdays Board of Supervisor's Hearing on STR's. We came to agreement on 2 main points to present:

1) enacting an ordinance per the Santa Monica precedent already in effect in their Coastal Zone, requiring STR operators to have a permanent resident living on the property, in either an ADU (Accessory Dwelling Unit) or part of the main house, thereby creating residential units in all second homes being STR's; and

2) instituting an add-on to the TOT (Transient Occupancy Tax) that would be channeled directly to West Marin affordable housing as Sup. Rodoni has proposed: for example, increasing the TOT from 10% to 15% in unincorporated Marin would provide \$1.6M/yr in revenue specifically for affordable housing in West Marin.

The County will be setting the agenda and time of the hearing on Thursday afternoon at http://www.marincounty.org/depts/bs/meetingarchive under Upcoming Events.

The meeting will be held in the Board of Supervisors Chambers, Room 330, Civic Center. People wanting to speak should check in when they arrive to see if they need to submit a speaker's card. People may also submit written comments to the Board of Supervisors by e-mailing < BOS@marincounty.org> at the latest by 4pm the day before the meeting. 

Heartache fuels Essence

For musicians and songwriters, heartache and pain can sometimes be the inspiration they need to get their creative juices flowing again. She probably wouldn't have wished it on herself, but, for Essence Goldman, the breakup of her 10-year marriage gave rise to the dark Americana songs on her new album, "Black Wings."


Essence (she goes by that one name), a familiar performer at Sweetwater Music Hall in Mill Valley and on other Marin stages, found catharsis and healing in writing songs like "Over My Head," an expression of the dread she felt when she dialed a suspicious number on her husband's cell phone, realizing her worst fears. On the gut bucket blues "She Said," she sings about a wise old woman telling her, "You should have left that man a long time ago. You're strong enough, honey, to go it alone."

After her divorce, and with her subsequent return to songwriting and recording, she found a support system in her co-writers, including Ira Marlowe, Rhys Williams, Alec McChesney, Merkley and Jeffrey Pease. A crew of top-notch musicians and producers, among them Roger Rocha, Danny Leuhring, Daniel Berkman, Jackie Greene Greg Ramirez, Ari Gorman and David Simon-Baker, played guitars, banjo, keyboards, ukulele, glockenspiel, bass and programmed drums, giving Essence's heartfelt and heart-breaking songs an authentic Americana instrumentation that lifts them above the slick and superficial.

Ironically enough, Goldman's previous album, "A Dog Named Moo and his Friend Roo," was a collection of children's songs. Looking back on it, she has jokingly said the experience made her want to shoot herself. But it led her to the spare, mostly acoustic and ultra-modern sound that's so special about "Black Wings," a record by a grown-up woman dealing with the kind of personal sorrow that can either ruin a person or do what it did for her. It turned her into a real artist writing real songs about real life.

Essence is performing on Saturday night, July 15, at Smiley's.





Herman Berlandt and Danille Vantress Poetry Reading. Roving



From Bakersfield to Bolinas

Dave Smith talking with Steve Heilig at the New School at Commonweal on Fri, June 30, 2017

Dave Smith and Steve are longtime friends and it was an easy interview for Steve - just let Dave talk. And it was a fascinating talk about the origin of the Haight Asbury Free Clinic and the Summer of Love and its aftermath.

First off however Steve asked Dave about growing up in Bakersfield. Dave talked about his early experience with prejudice in Bakersfield, in this case against the Okies emigrating to California. He related how his compassion for the Okies in Bakersfield was later reflected in his compassion for the hippies in San Francisco.

Dave talked about how he wound up living near Haight Street and establishing a medical practice during the Summer of Love that placed people above profit.

It was fascinating to hear how those times conspired to create the Free Clinic. But it's also inspiring to understand how Dave's strong code of ethics and principles helped him follow his destiny.

The evolution of the Free Clinic since the Summer of Love was another fascinating piece. After the brief flowering of the Summer of Love, Haight-Ashbury sunk into a quagmire of heroin and speed. Dave began to help the addicts, even though it was illegal to do so at the time.

"I broke the law a hundred times a day." he confessed.

Today the Free Clinic is still in the forefront of helping junkies. No longer illegal, addiction medicine has become an important part of mainstream medicine.

Celebrating the 50th Anniversay of the Summer of Love is a joyous occassion. But there is a subsequent hangover that can't be ignored.

We live in an addicted society. The opioid epidemic that is sweeping the heartland of America is a cry for help.

The lessons that Dave learned doctoring the Summer of Love are vitally important today. 50 years later and the need for healing the junkies is greater than ever.

My daughter asked me how I could stand to watch as the stomach, intestines, blubber, etc., was removed and laid on the beach for scavenger's later meals as I am very squeamish about anyone's medical or physical descriptions. It is because this is on a scale beyond any personal consideration; the majesty of this being is so great that even being dismembered by ant-like humans

she maintains a dignity and serenity that transcends human concerns. This creature is longer than my house, weighs tons, may be the largest being ever to live on Earth, dives up to a thousand feet to feed, has a tongue that weighs more than an elephant, eats tiny shrimp-like krill, may live 80 years, can grow to 130 feet in length, and is an endangered species.

All ages were present, observing: very young children staring silently, teenagers asking intelligent questions of any scientists who came near, older people talking quietly to each other as fluids jetted and parts heaved as containing flesh was cut away and a spray of something yellowish flew out from high on one side.

Overall and inescapable was the SMELL, a pervasive throat-gripping miasma of great strength that I could still taste in my sinuses 12 hours later.

Apparently she was killed by blunt force trauma, a speeding ship breaking many of her ribs and fracturing spinal vertebrae. This brings up many questions around our own complicity in "Modern Life": the headlong rush to use the latest communication or computing devices being rushed to us from China or where-ever to fill our on-line orders for consumer goods of all kinds. This article is being composed on one such device rather than being written in loopy longhand on sheets of crisp white paper made from crushed swollen tree-fibres. Although it may yet be printed on some... (Oh, those 1950s school films of Canadian logjams rushing to factories to be shredded into pulp for quarto or foolscap...).

This is what we have come to but maybe Bolinas Blue Whale Town can start to turn it around, push back against the tide, fight for slower ship speeds entering the Golden Gate shipping lanes and other places where known crossings of whale migratory routes are intersecting with harbor approaches (Seattle, Long Beach, etc.). As usual it is up to us, the slightly loony spiritually aware outsiders, to spearhead a movement in opposition to the mainstream.


