S.F. pal makes Clinton feel right at home

Susie Tompkins Buell's TV is broken, which is probably a good thing given that Republican presidential candidate Donald Trump has been tearing into Buell's good friend, Democratic candidate Hillary Clinton, on the airwaves.

"It's the lowest of the low," Buell said. "She's my friend, and to hear this blithering,

crazy narcissist say those things about her is literally appalling."

Tompkins Buell and her husband, Mark Buell, have turned their Pacific Heights penthouse into a sort of Airbnb for high-profile Democratic candidates. President Obama has been there so often for fundraisers that he joked that

he felt as if he lived there. This week Buell hosted Gabby Giffords, the former Arizona congresswoman who nearly died after being shot in the head by a deranged gunman in 2011.

"She still has a hard time communicating," Buell said. "But she is always smiling. She's like an angel."

she's formed a bond. The two chat about their kids, plan dinners and chat regularly, in person or on the phone. Clinton, who calls Buell "my free-spirited friend," is likely to get a text from Buell to point out something like a lovely full moon. It's that kind of relationship.

Hillary Clinton also spends time in Bolinas, where the Buells have a home. It's a place where

Some time later the Buells were at the White House and Hillary Clinton walked up holding a glass of white wine.

"Wouldn't you rather have a whiskey sour?" Mark asked.

Scientists Counter a Conspiracy Theory

Conspiracy theories can be stubborn, particularly in the echo chamber of the internet.

One persistent belief in some quarters is that the government — or business, perhaps — is deploying a fleet of jet aircraft to spray chemicals into the sky to control the population, food supply or other things.

As evidence, they point to what they call "chemtrails," which are more commonly known as contrails, or condensation trails, produced at high altitudes as water vapor in jet engine exhaust condenses and freezes.

Adding fuel to the chemtrails theory is the fact that there are a few legitimate reasons for atmospheric spraying — "seeding" clouds to make rain, for example — and in recent years there has been some research on the idea of spraying chemicals as a potential way to fight global warming.

But now, scientists have become more organized in their efforts to shoot down the idea, conducting a peer-reviewed study in Environmental Research Letters that debunks chemtrails supporters' claims.

The goal, the researchers say, is not so much to change the minds of hard-core believers, but to provide a rebuttal — the kind that would show up in a Google search — to persuade other people to steer clear of this idea.

Steven J. Davis, a climate scientist at the University of California, Irvine, said he had the idea for the study after a conversation with a salesman at a mattress store.

When the man found out what he did for a living, Dr. Davis said, "he had very serious questions about what we were going to do about the chemtrails problem."

Dr. Davis said that when he got home, he searched the internet for

peer-reviewed studies on the conspiracy theory, but found none.

The theory has been popularized on websites that display photographs of contrails but are described instead as chemtrails that persist in the atmosphere and contain harmful chemicals like strontium, barium and aluminum.

Other evidence cited by these theorists includes documents that are said to be laboratory analyses showing abnormally high levels of these and other chemicals in water and soil samples from areas where spraying is supposed to have taken place.

In the study, 77 scientists — experts in atmospheric chemistry and in the deposition of air

pollutants — were shown some of this evidence and asked whether a chemical spraying program was the simplest explanation for it or whether there were others that were more straightforward.

With the photographs, all of the experts chose science over conspiracy theory. For instance, in a photograph of a contrail broken by a gap, chemtrails supporters say the gap is proof the spraying was turned on and off.

All of the scientists, however, said there were reasonable scientific explanations for the gap, the most commonly cited being that the aircraft had passed through an area of drier air, which would make that part of the contrail dissipate more quickly.

The lab analyses were also dis-

missed as evidence of a spraying program, although some scientists said there was not enough data to draw any conclusion.

And in two cases, an expert thought the analyses might be evidence of spraying. Many of the scientists said that the analyses showed normal, not elevated, levels of the chemicals.

The 77 experts were also asked if, in their work or personal life, they had ever seen any evidence for a secret large-scale spraying program. All but one said no.

One scientist, who was not identified, said he or she had come across evidence of high levels of barium in the atmosphere in a remote area where soil levels of barium were low.

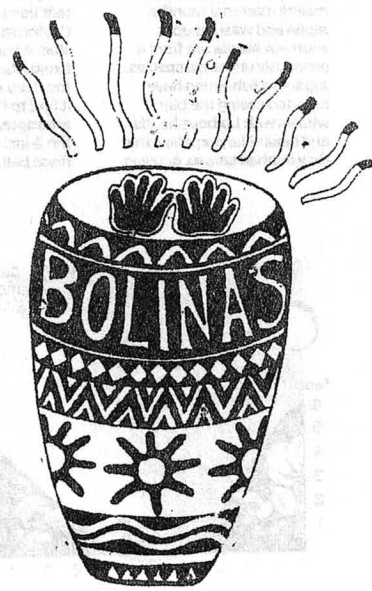
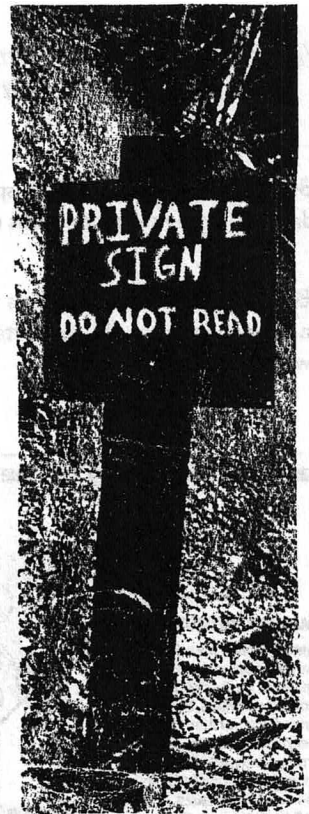
Dr. Davis said it was unclear whether this scientist had concluded that a secret spraying program existed.

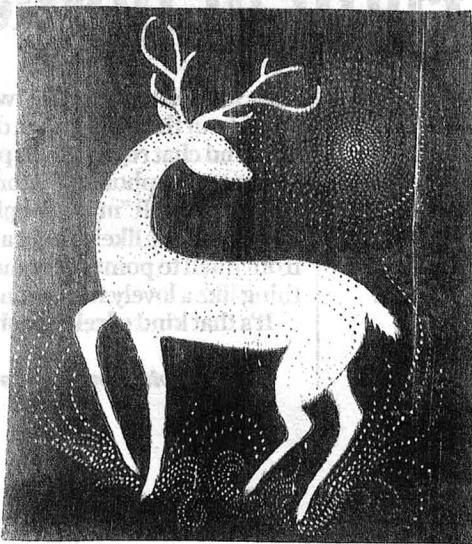
Mick West, who runs a website that debunks conspiracy theories and who helped formulate the study, said the fact that one scientist in 77 had seen what he or she took to be evidence of spraying "shows that scientists are not immune to these sorts of things."

Mr. West said the new study should help sway people who might otherwise be convinced by a chemtrails website. "You're trying to hold back the tide to a certain degree, and hopefully have less people fall into that way of thinking," he added.

Dr. Davis said he viewed this study as the latest effort by scientists to ensure that accurate information is available to counter misinformation from nonscientists.

"It's incumbent on us as scientists to get scientific perspectives out there," he said. "What we've seen with climate change science is that ignoring the deniers hasn't necessarily been an effective route."

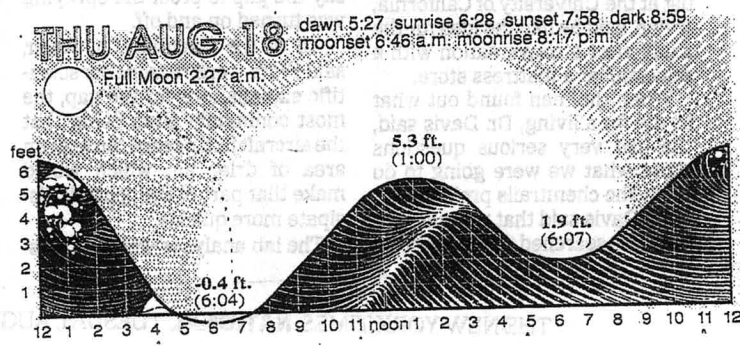
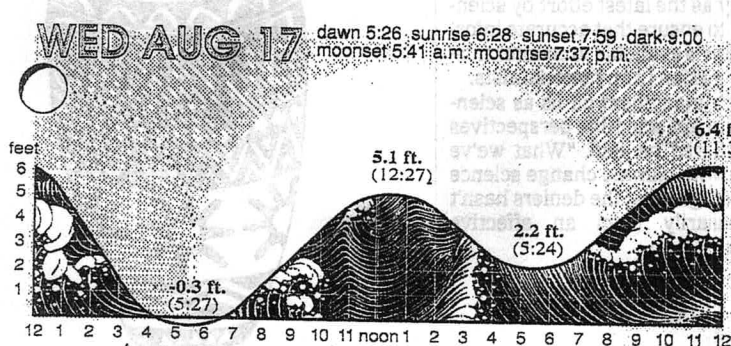

Earthweek: a diary of the planet For the week ending Friday, May 12. By Steve Newman

- Elusive whale**
Scientists have identified a new and extremely rare species of beaked whale, seldom seen alive, that roams parts of the northern Pacific Ocean. National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration molecular biologist Phillip Morin and colleagues confirmed through DNA testing that specimens of the marine mammal found in Japan and washed up in southern Alaska are from a previously unknown species. Japanese fishermen have reported seeing the black whales with bulbous heads and beaks like porpoises that they dubbed karasu, or raven.
- Live disco ball**
A mysterious purple orb discovered 5,000 feet beneath the Pacific off Southern California may be a new species of sea slug. A team from the nonprofit Ocean Exploration Trust made the discovery in the deep Arguello Canyon. The team says it had to fight off a curious crab that attempted to interfere with their sucking the 2-inch orb, which resembles a tiny disco ball, into a storage container.
- Bea decline**
Honeybee populations around the world plunged by almost 12 percent on average last year, sparking further concerns for the future of the important pollinators. Researchers from the Swiss honeybee research association COLOSS, at the University of Bern, found that the losses were caused by problems involving the hives' queens.
- Vintage losses**
Spring hail and frost have inflicted damage on some of France's key wine-producing regions and are likely to cause a 32 percent drop in production of Champagne this year, the country's agriculture ministry says. There will also be a 23 percent drop in Burgundy-Beaujolais and a 32 percent plunge in Val-de-Loire, the ministry says. Bordeaux appears to have been spared significant damage.
- Climate instability**
Research finds that current levels of greenhouse gases in the atmosphere are enough to warm land areas of the planet by more than the 1.5 degrees many policymakers had hoped to avoid. Scientists from the University of Exeter say there are two reasons for the predicted warming above preindustrial times. They say the atmosphere is out of equilibrium with current CO2 levels, causing the oceans to draw down huge amounts of heat from the atmosphere.

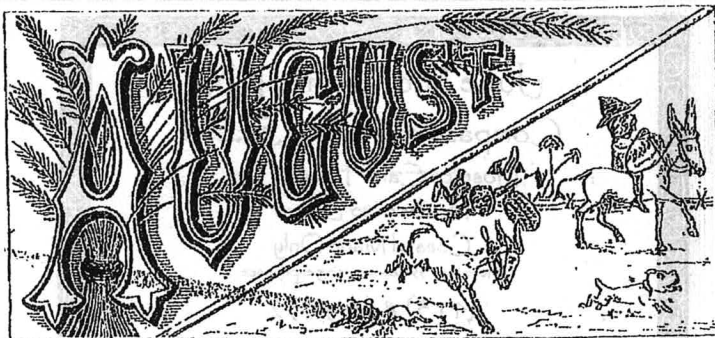
