

THE HUNGRY CAPITALISTS?

"Tuuuuuesday, Aaaaafternoon..." or so went the old Moody Blues song, and it was lodged in my head yesterday. It was a gorgeous, fall-like windy clear one too. I'd just been listening to the radio about Mitt Romney's leaked remarks about the supposed 47% of Americans he thinks are leaches on the rest of us, and needed to dislodge his voice and that song with some new information.

So I hurried to Commonweal to hear a New School talk by William Rosenzweig, very successful entrepreneur and now venture capitalist with a heart. Fascinating perspectives on his experiences trying to insert ecology, conscience, even 'progressive' values into the profit motive. "Things don't succeed because of their ideals and good values, but because they provide real economic value," he warned, noting that, in working with "natural" food-related businesses and looking for investors and partners, "we had to take" the word 'wellness' out of our documents, as we could not let them think we were concerned with anything other than the bottom line." He also warned that we were likely in for a period of uncertainty, even upheaval, with drought, price explosions especially for meat and fish, and many more food-related challenges.

Yet he held out hope, and some examples, of progress. He called the 1960s/70s a time of "waking up" to the need for for more sustainable, healthy food production and distribution, favored labeling of GMOs even as he opined that humanity likely could not feed the coing 9 billion people without them, admired Michelle Obama's nutritionrelated efforts, held that even the takeover of smaller natural food startups by big corporations had some benefits, and told of examples of two young women, former students of his at UC

Today I'll answer reader questions on the new Cal Fire fee

A: The Howard Jarvis
Taxpayers Association
plans to file a lawsuit
within a month challenging the state law that
imposes a new fee on
owners of habitable
structures in areas
where the state is responsible for fire prevention. However, to
avoid fate penalties and
be eligible for a potential
refund, you should pay
the fee by the due date.

The California Board of Equalization is collecting the fee on behalf of the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection (Cal Fire). It has sent bills to owners of about 130,000 of the 825,500 properties that are within the state's responsibility area. It is sending bills county by county in alphabetical order starting with Alameda and expects to be done by the end of the year.

The fee is \$150 per habitable structure, with a \$35 discount if the property is within the state's responsibility area but also within the boundaries of a local fire protection agency.

The Jarvis association plans to file a classaction suit on the grounds that the fee is really a tax that needs two-thirds legislative approval. If it wins, the state could not impose this fee in the future, says Timothy Bittle, the association's director of legal affairs.

However, to be eligible

for a refund of past fees, property owners need to pay the fee and file a protest form with three state agencies within 30 days of the fee-billing date, he says.

Homeowners can use this same form, called a Petition for Remediation, to protest the fee on other grounds, such as the property is not in the state's responsibility area or did not receive the \$35 discount.


But to become eligible for a refund if the association prevails, they should download the form from the Jarvis website (go to firetax protest.org and click on "refund") and mail it to the three agencies. This version has box number four, "other reason," checked and includes the necessary legal verbiage.

If the fee is deemed illegal, the Legislature could pass a bill mandating refunds for everyone who paid the fee, whether or not they jumped through these hoops. But there's no guarantee that will hap-

Marin History Watch: Plotting out Bolinas' Granda Vista

On Sept. 12, 1895, Frank Waterhouse began his three-year service as postmaster of Bolinas (pictured in 1900 featuring Bolinas Point and Embarcadero). Searching for an escape from the heat of Sacramento where he was a banker, Waterhouse in 1882 bought Jose Briones' 131-acre dairy ranch, subdivided it into 50-foot lots (each selling for \$500) and created "Granda Vista," Marin County's first housing development. Residential streets were also laid out, including 60-foot-wide Brighton Avenue that accessed the beach. However, for all his contributions his wife, Nellie, proved to be more popular. An artist who once traveled to the Farallones to paint, she brought over hundreds of cypresses from Pacific Grove to beautify surrounding hillsides.


BOLINAS IS NOT A GOOD MOTHER





Berkeley's business school who started a healthy school lunch company now serving over 1490 schools in 5 states, profitably. Their name? Revolution Foods. And he reflected that "When I started teaching there, people would say "What are you doing teaching tree-hugging?' But now, ten years later, so many students there want to do good, in addition to being profitable."

Overall Rosenzweig felt that the biggest need and challenge in our food realm was for systemic changes that would be far from easy, for such changes are up against "hungry capitalists" who are inpatient for profit, and profit only. His term recalled the "hungry ghosts," of Buddhism, who wander homeless, suffering from greed, envy, and jealousy. Maybe 1% of us are those? Or 47%?

From there it was back downtown for a walk on a stunning beach, enough sand to go all the way around for a change, mountain and sky and sea in their best light. Then to Pirate Pizza night (between Amleto and the Pirates, this town must have more tasty slices per capita than anywhere, BYOB). And then to the library for another talk, "Shamanism and the Sacred Art" by Frank Echenhofer, PhD, professor of clinical psychology at SF's California Institute of Integral Studies. A good turnout heard his tales of visiting Amazonian shamans, with vivid slides, videos, and recordings of the distinct songs sung during some of the healing sessions using this unique, fascinating "brew" of two plants - the "Vine of the soul" or, "Vine of Death," which he said "can facilitate an inquiry into the meaning of existence" via "a kind of very intense lucid dreaming" and not only that, is being used to treat addiction. He warned that it is not for everybody, admitting that "I would not want my 22-year old daughter to try it, as she is too sensitive already." Some of the paintings he showed were incredibly vivid and beautiful. Echenhofer used the generic term "entheogen" for such substances that, properly used, "can show you the divine."

Walking uphill to the Mesa in the very dark moonless night, the Milky Way was soaring all the way from the heavens into Duxbury Reef. The surf murmured below; Owls hooted above. It was as mystical as one could ask.

Two talks on one autumnal afternoon; ying and yang? Two sides of the same coin? Who knows, but I do know this: Only in Bolinas.

Angels We Have Heard While High / Religion scholar Huston Smith looks at drug use and spiritual experiences

CLEANSING THE DOORS OF PERCEPTION

The Religious Significance of Entheogenic Plants and Chemicals By Huston Smith Tarcher/Putnam; 173 pages

Drug abuse has been called the United States' worst public health problem, and our government has waged a "war on drugs" for decades with decidedly mixed results. Drugs, especially tobacco and alcohol, sicken and kill millions of Americans, and the list of illegal drugs is long, with drug users

filling our prisons. What might it mean, then, when one of the world's most renowned religious scholars writes in his new book, "Cleansing the Doors of Perception," that some select illegal drugs hold the potential for humans to realize their highest spiritual potential, and that use of these drugs might even be part of the very

origin of man's greatest aspirations and faiths? Longtime Berkeley resident Huston Smith is no dope fiend. He's not even another Timothy Leary. Smith has taught at some of the nation's leading universities, holds 11 honorary degrees and written 11 books, including "The World's Religions," the most widely used text on comparative religion, selling over 2 million copies in the past 30 years. He has produced a number of television series and was himself the subject of a Bill Moyers PBS series, titled "The Wisdom of Faith With Huston Smith.

Smith holds that true seekers do not use entheogens, which he defines as "virtually nonaddictive drugs that seem to harbor spiritual potentials," just for kicks. "Emotionally the drug experience can be like having forty-foot waves crash over you for several hours while you cling desperately to a life raft which may be swept from under you at any moment," he reports. In other words, for a seeker, entheogens are likely to be more challenging than thrilling, but with the potential to make 'epochal" changes in one's view of the meaning of life.

As for any connection of drugs with authentic religion, Smith laments that "it is next to impossible to speak of it in the West today without being misunderstood" - in other words, without being labeled "pro-drug." But he feels so strongly that such a link exists that he likens our cultural denial of it to earlier refusals to accept that the Earth rotates around the sun. "When the fact that drugs can trigger religious experiences becomes incontrovertible," he notes hopefully, "discussion will move to the more difficult question of how this fact is to be interpreted." Ever scholarly, Smith's admittedly tentative attempts at this interpretation are replete with fascinating historical references and quotes from thinkers ranging from Plato to Jung to William James. He looks back at ancient India, where entire sects used psychoactive mushrooms until the "quality" of religiously based drug use declined: "Three thousand years in advance of our times, India may have found herself on the brink of a psychedelic mess like the one America created in the 1960s.

Seemingly aware of the risks of overstating his case, Smith notes that drug-induced "theophanies," or religious revelations, are often not lasting, and that "[o]pening the gates of heaven at the start, there comes a time -- I can attest to this myself — when they begin to open either onto less and less or onto the demonic." The dreaded bad trip, then, is also a hazard for the true seeker.

Among the often-startling footnotes here is the revelation that Bill Wilson, the revered founder of Alcoholics Anonymous, told Smith that he had tried LSD and "counted his entheogen experience as equal in the conviction it engendered to the conversion experience that led him to his founding of Alcoholics Anonymous." Equally startling to many will be the mention of experiments with cancer and other severely ill patients who had their pain, both physical and emotional, radically helped with the use of entheogenic drugs. Smith's language and thinking do venture into arcane regions. But after all its deep inquiry into matters metaphysical and pharmacological, "Cleansing the Doors of Perception" closes with a crucial real-world policy question: "Can a way be found to legitimize, as the Greeks did, the constructive, life-giving use of entheogenic heaven-and-hell drugs without aggravating our serious drug problem?"

Smith does not propose to answer that riddle. What he does do in this brilliant, challenging, warmly written and courageous book is provide the strongest case yet for why that very

question might be so important.


