

Find Bolinas, a hidden Marin haven where '60s idealism endures

Why: Bolinas, a lagoon-adjacent haven of 1,600 bohemian souls in an off-overlooked corner of Marin County, has been operating incognito for decades. Locals steal road signs so that outsiders can't find their way in. Now that attitude might be softening, and the town, surrounded by hiking, surfing and kayaking opportunities, is fascinating.

What: About 50 years ago, hard-core Bolinas locals started stealing the town's highway sign and they never stopped. The goal, conceived in back-to-the-land idealism, was to build a nature-friendly community without the distractions and economic distortions of tourism. But as properties turn over and GPS renders signage moot, Bolinas seems to be evolving. Whether you're on the water or Wharf Road, it's a great place to think about hippie legacies and the nature of community at a time when Bay Area real estate is very nearly a blood sport.

Don't expect a tourist welcome center, but if you show up mellow and humble there's no reason you shouldn't drop in for a bite at the Coast Cafe; browse the tiny but well-appointed Bolinas Museum (open Fridays through Sundays only), or drink at Smiley's Schooner Saloon and Hotel, which goes back to the 19th century. In fact, Smiley's (which got new owners in 2015) offers live music four nights a week and rents out six rooms in back. I siept comfortably in one. On the street and in Smiley's, I was an obvious outsider with a camera around my neck, but everyone I met treated me well and Enzo Resta told me how his uncle may have been the first to take the town sign back in the day.

You'll see plenty of gray pony tails (and experience rotten cellphone service). And keep an eye out for BO Gas, the only nonprofit service station I've ever encountered. The rates are shockingly high (\$4.66 a gallon in early August) but the money helps support the Bolinas Community Land Trust.

Where: Wharf Road, the commercial heart of town, is 25 miles northwest of San Francisco, just north of Stinson Beach, south of Point Reyes Station, 414 miles northwest of downtown L.A.

Info: There's no Bolinas Visitors Bureau — probably never will be. But there's a Marin Convention & Visitors Bureau to tell you what's nearby.



Brian, not Bryan

The beauty of the fence (besides the intricate pattern of steel) is its transparency. Ordinary wooden fences are opaque barriers.


One can witness this phenomena all over the Mesa as more privacy barriers are erected. These wooden walls ensure privacy but seal out the natural beauty.

A growing concern: keeping farms alive

Bay Area's organic acreage imperiled as owners age

Advocates of Bay Area agriculture and organics have been waiting to learn the fate of Star Route Farms since owner Warren Weber put his 100-acre Bolinas farm up for sale in 2013.

When news broke this month that the University of San Francisco has purchased the property that was the state's first certified organic farm, many responded with enthusiasm. "It's a symbol of the importance of farming and of farmland conservation," said Jamison Watts, director of the Marin Agricultural Land Trust. Not only is the land going to remain a working organic farm, but the university plans to use it to educate students.

Yet if the sale is an omen of the future of

farming in the Ray Area — and organic agriculture in particular — it's a hard one to read. The unconventional nature of the deal, rather than the institutional buyer that purchased the land, may signal a future that Bay Area food lovers can look toward.

The 76-year-old Weber's desire to sell the farm he founded in 1974 is a bell-wether for an entire generation that has reached retirement age. According to the most recent U.S. Department of Agriculture census of agriculture, the average age of farmers in California in 2012 was 60. Almost a quarter were over 70. Only 4 percent were under age

The Farm LASTS Project, which studies succession planning for farmers, has estimated that in the next 20 years, 70 percent of all privately owned farms and ranches in the United States will change hands. Although organic farmers are younger on average than conventional ones, California Certified Organic Farmers, the primary certification agency in the state, recently found that 200 of the 2,500 farms on its rolls had been certified organic for more than 20 years.

Many aging farmers must sell their farms to fund their retirement. Yet it's not as simple as putting a home or business on the market and decamping to Arizona, "It's selling your life's work," said Liya Schwartzman, who works on California FarmLink's Agracian Elders Project. "The hope is that in the transition you're finding someone who will preserve the legacy of the farmflind and also the farm business."

"The price of land is a huge obstacle," said filmmaker Deborah Koons Garcia, whose documentary "Agrarian Elders" about Weber and other organic pioneers will be released in 2013. "When they sell, farmers want to be able to retire, but the people coming in, no matter how young and enthusiastic — that's a lot of money to come up

For Alice Waters, was there life before Chez Panisse? Oh my, yes indeed.

It's a legacy that many beginning organic farmers would love to take on, particularly in the Bay Area, where farmers receive so much respect for their work and their food. Yet few can,

Dennis Dierks of Paradise Valley Produce has been farming in Bolinas as long as Weber has. He and his wife had no intention of moving off their property, which they purchased in 1972 as part of a cooperative, but their three oldest children weren't interested in the long workdays and strenuous labor. "I've been trying to find someone to train, but it was difficult," he said. Then, last season, his youngest daughter and her husband announced that they wanted in. "That was a major relief for me."


