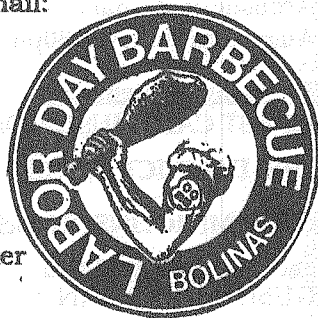

Upcoming Tree Work

We have recently obtained Coastal, Design Review and Building Permits to begin work on the Bolinas Downtown Park. One of the first things we will be doing as described in our permits is removing or pollarding the remaining eucalyptus trees on the park hillside. As part of the permit process, we were required to submit an arborist's report. The report, produced by Moritz Arboricultural Consulting, suggests that the eucalyptus trees on the park property, because of their height and subject to winds, are a destabilizing effect on the hillside. The report recommends that the eucalyptus trees be removed from the hillside and that the trees directly below Altura Avenue be pollarded with the stump sprouts to be maintained at no higher than 20' until new oak trees are planted and sufficiently established. By following these recommended stages, we intend to minimize the impact of this requirement mandated in the Conditions of Approval of our Coastal Permit.

We will be hiring the Oakanders to perform the work that should begin within the next couple of weeks. We hope to do this in a manner that is not an inconvenience to our neighbors.

Got Mice? Get an Owl

Marin group pushes for owls, not rodent poison

Facing a rodent problem? Before you head to the hardware store for rat poison, Alex Godby, founder of the Marin-based nonprofit Hungry Owl Project (HOP), wants to persuade you that there are better ways to deal with rats and mice.

And one of those ways is to attract owls by installing nest boxes and keeping the surrounding area free of rodenticides, which can be deadly not just to rodents but also to the birds and other predators that feed on poisoned animals and then die themselves.

"I don't think people realize how detrimental [rodenticides] are to the environment," says Godby. "The threat they present to wildlife and pets, and that they don't actually work in the long term."

Over in Bolinas, HOP volunteer Stockton Buck hopes to take the effort a few steps further than just an owl box in his backyard: He recently started a "Rodenticide-Free Bolinas" campaign in the small West Marin community at the souther end of the Point Reyes peninsula.

"Because Bolinas is a small and isolated enough community, if we could convince those in Bolinas to forego rodenticides then we could create an environment free of influence from surrounding communities," says Buck. Wildlife there, in other words, would be unlikely to encounter poisons in neighboring towns.

Buck began his campaign by sending out surveys to Bolinas residents. About 10 percent have responded, nearly all "strongly in favor of" a rodenticide-free Bolinas, given viable alternatives. "If you care about the environment, it's hard to argue against," he says. "There are so many downsides to poisons, to me it isn't worth it."

Through HOP, Buck has installed three owl boxes in Bolinas, and he says he hopes to eventually install at least 100 boxes throughout the community.

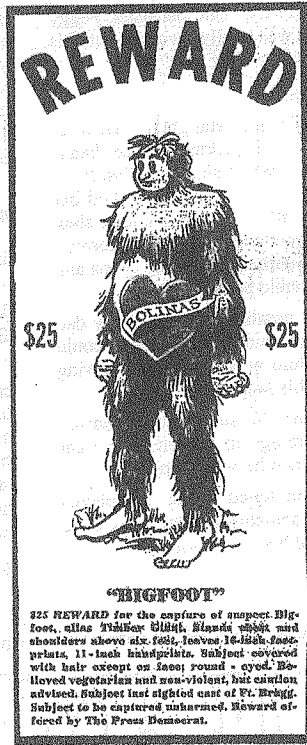
Godby has similarly high hopes for the project, especially because HOP now has a full decade of experience encouraging barn owls as natural rodent control, which she touts as better for the environment, good for owl populations, and effective--barn owls are skilled predators with fast metabolisms, capable of consuming thousands of rodents in a season.

If the Rodenticide-Free Bolinas campaign goes well, it may inspire similar measures in other parts of the Bay Area. As Godby says, "We're hoping that if one town can set the example then others will follow."

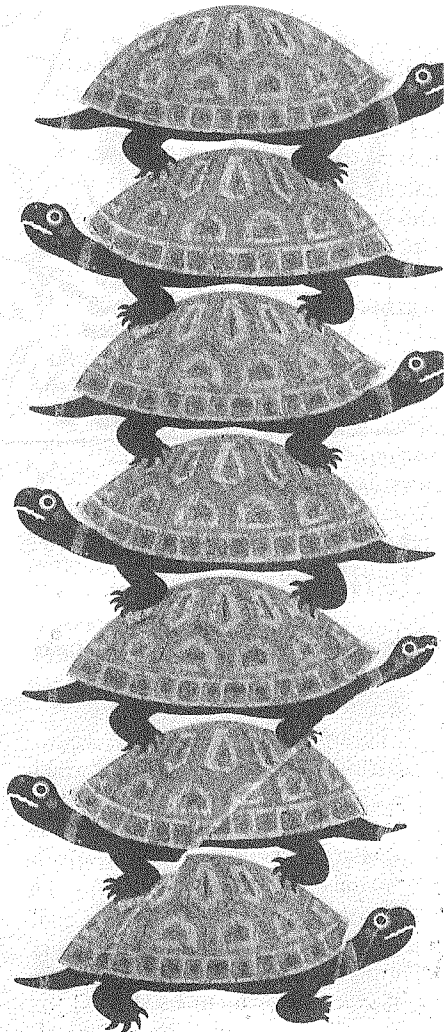

Memorial set for David Gleason of Bolinas

A memorial gathering will be held Sunday, September 4, for longtime Bolinas resident David Gleason, who died June 16 from cancer. He was 62.

A stonemason and tile artisan, a surfer and a dad, Mr. Gleason first came to Bolinas in the late 1960s. He built a house near the cliff, a free-form design with angled ceilings and walls — one partition made entirely from bottles cemented together.

A surfer through and through, Mr. Gleason lived simply and had a utopian dream of building a community on an imagined self-sustaining island called Surf City, said Ed Pohlman of Bolinas, a friend of 40 years. Tuned into the dynamics of the ocean, Mr. Gleason died during a minus tide, when the moon's pull is strongest, Mr. Pohlman said.

Mr. Gleason moved to Hawaii for a time, operating an organic coffee plantation on the Big Island and rearing his children there with Debbie Gleason, his wife at the time. "Becoming a father changed

his life completely," said his sister, Peggy Beasley. "He was totally involved with his kids."

THE BIG ISLAND

This week his daughter, Heather Gleason, recalled picking coffee beans with her father while singing, "I've Been Working on the Railroad." He called her to dinner by blowing into a conch shell and made hot chocolate in the morning from scratch, with unsweetened cocoa and a dash of cayenne pepper.

"The most notable thing about my dad was his laugh," said his daughter. "I could always find him at a party by following the sound of his laughter."

His 16-year-old son, Evan Gleason, died two years ago in Hawaii after a car struck the moped he was riding.

Mr. Gleason loved music. He played the clarinet — sometimes even to the birds — and outfitted his house with a surround-sound system.

EARLY YEARS

Born on January 19, 1949, in Pasadena,

he attended Rosemead High School, played football and tennis, and took piano lessons from a concert pianist in Los Angeles. He went on to UC Santa Barbara, staying in school briefly, and began making surfboards. Like his father before him, he then became a mason.

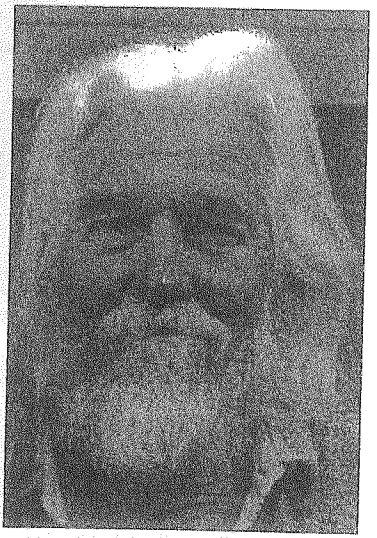
Never shy about sharing his strong opinions, "David was a gifted individual, a creative and independent thinker," his sister said.

He was predeceased by his mother, Gerry Gleason; and by his son, Evan Gleason.

Mr. Gleason is survived by his daughter, Heather Gleason of Rosamond, Kern County; father and stepmother, Bob and Mildred Gleason of Laguna Woods, Orange County; sister, Diane Whitmer of Rancho Santa Margarita, Orange County; and by his sister and brother-in-law, Peggy and Tom Beasley of Buchanan, Tennessee.

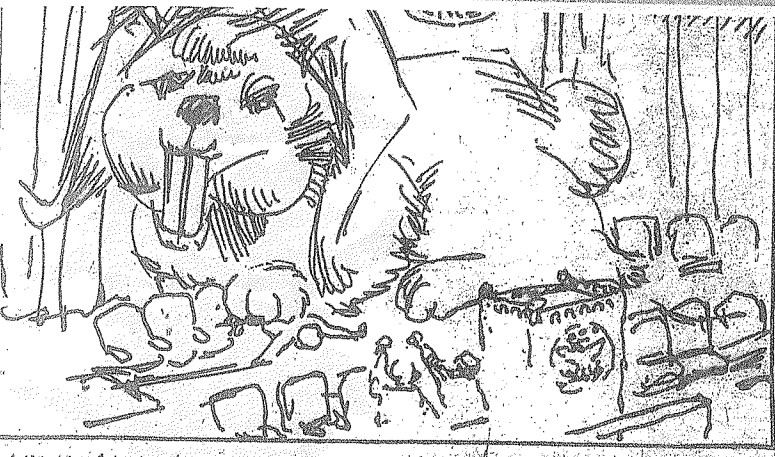
SURFER'S FUNERAL

at 11 a.m., and return to a potluck gathering back on the beach.

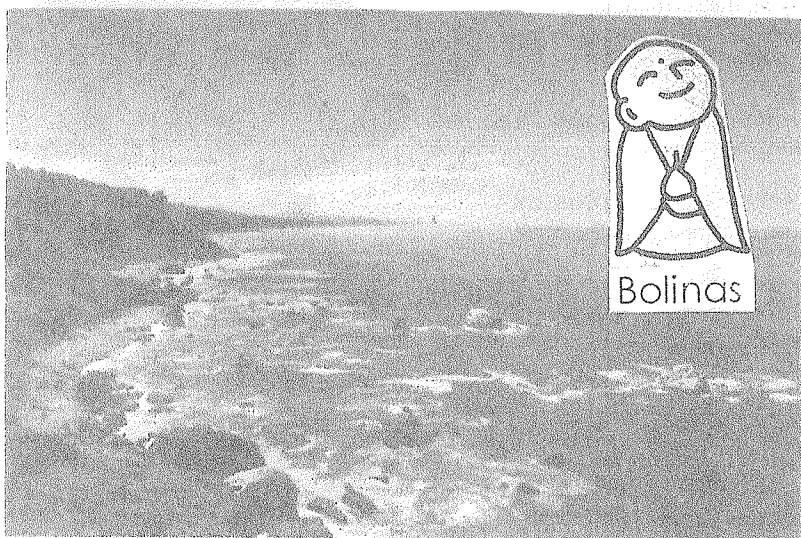

The small town of Bolinas may ordinarily pale in comparison to neighboring San Francisco, but its Labor Day festivities have big city appeal. For visitors who can find it (signs for the town off the main road are notoriously unmarked), the annual Bolinas Labor Day Festival promises delicious BBQ, great music — thanks to popular local bands like the Bolinas Dub Squad — and a massive dance party in the street.

Alternatively, those looking for a more low-key getaway can hike to the popular Alamere Falls or just relax and have a picnic on Bolinas Beach.

Labor Day deal: Since the accommodation options here are slim, Orbitz's Tornatore suggests staying at the Larkspur Hotel in nearby Mill Valley, where AAA members who stay Sunday through Thursday always save up to 25%.

Known for its laid-back coastline and artistic locals, Bolinas Beach is home to an ever-changing outdoor arts scene with reusable canvas. The concrete walls surrounding the beach brim with vibrant, painted images — from a series of alien-like creatures to a shiny, mystical mermaid goddess, and even a surfboard-clad Frankenstein. Be sure to snap photos; similar to galleries, art here rotates, so your favorites might be painted over the next time you visit. If you're lucky, you might witness a few artists in action (Bolinas has a straightforward graffiti and stencil work policy: the wall's the limit). After perusing the paintings, pick up some food at the Bolinas People's Store (14 Wharf Road). Its focus on organic food and locally produced breads, cheeses, and greens ensures you'll find some wholesome picnic fare to enjoy on the west side of the beach — a sheltered spot near the paintings. This wall watch never gets old.

TIP: Bolinas Beach is one of the best beginner surf spots in the Bay Area. For lessons and board and wetsuit rentals, check out 2 Mile Surf Shop on Brighton Avenue (about a five-minute walk from the beach).

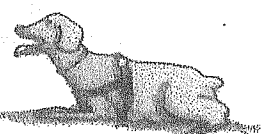
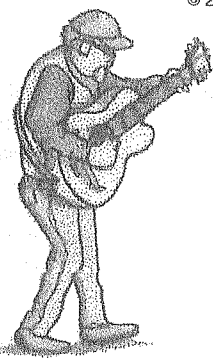

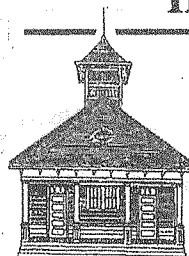
