

UPDATE ON COLLEGE OF MARIN PROPERTY ON WHARF ROAD

On August 2, 2017, Ralph Camiccia and I, along with Dennis Rodoni, met with representatives of the College of Marin to discuss the vacant Wharf Road property which once was used for Marine Biology studies. The property includes the buildings and the dock across the road. We had requested the meeting to pursue either having the college rehabilitate the property and restore its use, or decide not to retain it and dispose of it as surplus. Because it has a number of structural and hazardous materials problems, the cost of remediation exceeds the property's market value.

The College representatives, including the Board's President and the College President, said they would recommend declaring the property as surplus and to passing it on for use by the Bolinas community, unless the community was not interested. On Wednesday, August 16, 2017, at the BCPUDs monthly meeting, the public will be asked to submit comments on the proposed transfer to the Bolinas community.

Since there will be any number of ideas on what to do with the property, and how it should be owned and managed, it has been suggested that a committee be formed to collect and organize those ideas. The purpose of this item on the Boards August agenda is limited only to soliciting input on the proposal of the community acquiring





USF has bought the (organic) farm

University will keep character of chefs' favorite, Star Route Farms

Star Route Farms in Bolinas, a pioneering organic farm that has been a favorite of Alice Waters and other Bay Area chefs for decades, has found an unexpected buyer.

The University of San Francisco has purchased the farm, the oldest continually operating certified organic farm in California, for \$10.4 million. The property has been on the market since 2013.

Warren Weber, 76, who founded the farm in 1974, said the university is committed to continuing to operate the business as usual. Weber will stay on for a time as a consultant.

The 100-acre farm supplies 'Little Gem' lettuces, fava beans and heirloom vegetables with names like 'Fairy Tale' eggplants to Bay Area farmers' markets and restaurants. It will continue, under the same name, serving its restaurant and farmers' market customers, said Donald E. Heller, USF provost and vice president of academic affairs.

'First and foremost we're committed to continuing to operate it as a working farm," said Heller. Farm manager Annabelle Lenderink and other workers will remain on staff.

The university does not have a traditional agriculture department but does offer classes on urban agriculture, including one that focuses on sustainable farm-

For Waters, owner of Chez Panisse restaurant in Berkeley, the purchase marks a milestone in Bay Area farming.

That piece of property is very very special because it's at the entrance of the town," said

Waters. "That was one of the first gardens that we bought food from for Chez Panisse. It's really symbolic to me. But it's way more than that. It's the idea that edible education is valuable. That students could really learn by doing and actually being engaged with the work of a running

According to Heller, the purchase is an opportunity to provide educational and re search opportunities to USF faculty and students, such as



science department and hospitality management program. He doesn't expect academic programs to begin on the farm until the 2018-19 school

To see how an organic farm operates and serves the food industry - we think it will be a really great opportunity," said Heller. "Certainly we think this will be a nice complement to some of the programs we have already.

The university paid for the farm'in part with private donations. Heller would not disclose how much had come from donors but said more private funding for the farm purchase is in the works.

'Our balance sheet is in very good shape. It's got very low debt," he said. "This is a relatively small item for us.

In March, the university's board approved an operating budget of around \$457 million for the 2017-18 academic year, and its endowment is about

\$300 million. Undergraduate tuition and fees are \$45,760.

The purchase includes the 100 acres of property, 40 of which are farmed, as well as agriculture equipment and buildings.

Investment in a farm by a private and urban liberal arts college shows how much interest there is in learning

about agriculture, and not just at land-grant universities, said Gail Feenstra, deputy director of the Sustainable Agriculture Research and Education Program at UC Division of Agriculture and National Resourc-

'If there's an actual farm on-site, there's a lot more opportunity for practical learning as opposed to from a book. Having access to a working farm would just be an invaluable experience, said Feenstra. "It's amazing how many young people coming out of universities are interested in going into farm-

ing right now - and they don't have experience becau their parents didn't farm."

Weber founded Star Rou Farms on 5 acres in Bolina

using horse-drawn sulky plows and cultivators and lot of long-haired ambition as the official history goes. was at the beginning of the modern organic movement right after the founding of California Certified Organi Farmers in 1973, an organization for which Weber has served as president.

Though many predicted that Weber's unorthodox methods would fail, he we on to supply vegetables to some of the region's best re taurants, such as Chez Panisse and Zuni-Cafe, while operating stands at the Ma Civic Center and Ferry Pla farmers' markets. Weber's renown for sustainable far ing spread so far that the eco-conscious Prince Char

and his wife, Camilla, visite Star Route Farms during a tos by Liz Hafalla / The Chronic 2005 tour of Marin County.

In 2013, Weber put the fa on the market for a reporte \$12.5 million. He continues live on the farm with his w Amy Nathan, but they plan move to Kentfield because their home was sold in the

Weber said that he and h wife are pleased with the sa

"I think they're going to good stewards, and I think they're going to bring some new energy to the farm and educating around agricultuissues and food issues," sai Weber, "It'll continue to be run as it has been run, and I'm going to be consulting with them over the next co ple of years. We're going to make sure that that happen

Bolinas' Star Route Farms bought by USF By Tom Gogola

he "OG" of certified organic farming in California, Star Route Farms in coastal Bolinas, was bought by the Jesuit University of San Francisco this week, it was announced.

News of this sale had been rumored for months around the various gossip-chewing maypoles of Bolinas, and this week the university announced that the deal had indeed gone down, as of Tuesday, July 8.

University spokeswoman Ellen Ryder says the purchase price for the farm was \$10.4 million, "which

included [the] property (land and buildings), equipment, business operations, etc."

The university will use the 100acre property as a teaching farm and community-outreach platform, and . USF president Rev. Paul. J. Fitzgerald says in a statement that the purchase will enable and enhance "USF's commitment to environmental and social justice," central tenets of a Jesuit faith that encourages righteous activism in the name of Jesus and this hot and holy damaged planet of ours,

The purchase will save Star Route for future generations of would-be

organic farmers, and it forever protects a glorious swath of West Marin from a feared onslaught of big-ticket developers who would turn the Bolinas Lagoon-side sprawl into, God help us, a condo complex. That was the fear, anyway, as the aging Star Route founder Warren Weber reportedly spent the past several years trying to find an appropriate buyer.

Weber opened Star Route Farms in 1974 and runs it with his wife, Amy. It provides sustainable, organic vegetables—rows of kale are currently waving in the fresh foggy breeze of Bolinas—to restaurants

and markets around the Bay Area.

Says Weber in a statement, "We are very pleased and honored that the University of San Francisco will continue the Star Route Farms legacy. We hope young people, entry-level farmers, and farmers around the world who struggle with conventional agriculture will learn from the passion and expertise that USF offers this enterprise."

Alice Waters, chef and author, and founder of the estimable sustainable and organic-only Chez Panisse in Berkeley, noted that "school-supported agriculture is an idea whose time has come" as she praised Weber for continuing the operation and launching an "interactive educational program that can be a model for the rest of the country."

Traci Des Jardins, the chef-owner of Jardinière in San Francisco says she's been buying Weber's product for decades. "The preservation and continuation of this visionary farm will play an important role in educating new generations."

Looking ahead, the new owners expect a seamless transition to a full takeover of the farm. Current operations will continue, and Weber's employees' jobs are safe, assures the university. Plans in the works include cross-disciplinary research, community education, "and programs focused on nutrition, biodiversity, sea level rise, and more."

Star Route has indeed come a long way in its pioneering role as California's first organic-certified farm. Weber's farm started as a five-acre tract that utilized horse-drawn plows and, as the university notes in its announcement, was a pioneer in adopting "production and post-harvest technologies such as precision planters and hydrocooling equipment which allowed it to bring the freshest possible product to market.*




