Hippocrates Hearsay Aug. 24, '12

Dear Mom and Magi,

Well, the best layed plans of mice and men (in our case, of cats and women), we did not head to Kos and the tree of Hippocrates because Winfield and company were too hung over from last night's ouzo revelries.

My friend, Viv, and I headed up to the ancient village to do our shopping - bread from the village ovens, Greek rose wine, olives from the brine which I have mixed with fresh garlic, island olive oil, Greek oregano and a little Balsamic vinegar, olive oil powder soap for the laundry, watermelon juice!!! and a local treat called Bougatza made by Manolo's mother. Bougatza is a puff pastry/filo delicacy stuffed with baked apple, cinnamon and wild thyme honey. Manolo is a mama's boy who runs the little cafe which makes the best tzatziki. We do not care that we walk around smelling of garlic, dill, mint, yogurt and cucumber. We have even taken to wearing our sundresses on our scooter which of course is completely irreverent, but liberating. Our knickers flash as we speed down the road to the next errand. The old ladies in their widows' weeds are not shocked. They just think we are aliens who will soon return to our own personal galaxy in due time. The old men on their wicker chairs stare at us over their ouzo or frappes and dream of days gone by.

The wind has picked up and we are in our little house amongst the olive trees eating cold muscat grapes and watching the next episode of "Cats R Us." Mama kitty has given one of her kittens a rat. Viv rushed in to report. Kitten sat on the bottom stair and I shoosed him into the olive grove. Mama kitty sits in the shade exhausted from her morning hunt flicking her tail, so proud of her baby who is relishing the delicate pink island ear of rat. Other kitten comes mewling because he is not so lucky.

We have named many of the cats:

two orange tabby adolescent brothers are named Daryl and his other brother Daryl - photo attached.

Then there is Herman (for Hermes)

Ziggy for Zeus

Athena

Doris

Marmalade, Figgy, Filo and Roger.

The cutest one is named Mirabelle.

We are off to see what remains of the Greek Theater (I found it the other day in the pine forest above the sea). There are more ruins which are simply slowly falling into the sea.

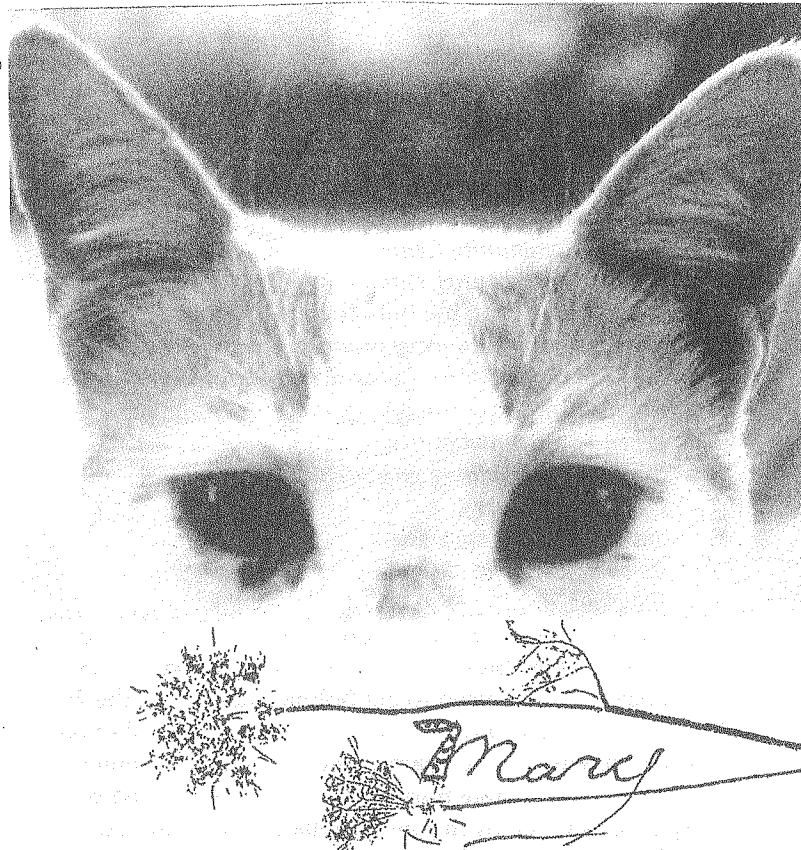

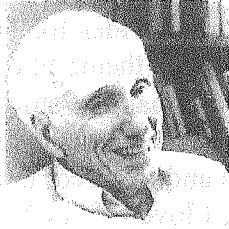

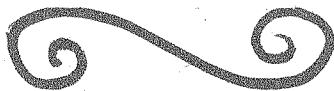
WE WILL BUILD IT IF YOU WILL SWIM!

True Stories (Take 2)

My husband who rarely goes to plays (unless I'm in them and he has to) never misses *True Stories* and calls it "the best entertainment in town. I stole the idea for *True Stories* from *Spark* in Santa Monica. It is a story-telling event once a month with a theme like "Blue" or "Mothers," for example. Seven "folks like you and me" read aloud a personal/true story 6 to 8 minutes long. My brother was reading a story for *Spark* about when we hijacked a plane to Oaxaca (true story!), and I was in LA and able to see the show. I was moved and inspired: honest, real, moving, funny, entertainment. No baloney, no hype, and no phoniness. I loved everything about it. The individual readers became one: raw, imperfect, and lovable humanity. And, though I might not relate to the specific details of people's stories, I could relate to the emotions and the human experience. I even loved the free refreshments afterwards (so generous) and the chance to talk to readers and share stories. "I wanna do that in Baja!" I thought. So, I copied their rules (minus the theme--our town is too small to limit the stories) found a space and got 7 people courageous enough to tell a story, and did it. People, both readers, and audience loved it, so I have continued. I have done 6 in Baja, so far.

Last year, I decided to venture into Bolinas where we spend our summers (hurricane season in Baja). This was a bit harder for different reasons. People are busier, I am not well known enough to coerce people or call in favors, and people here don't like ANY rules. (And, believe me, rules are few: personal/true, 6 to 8 minutes when read aloud.) I cancelled the normally required rehearsal (people are too busy, plus no need for a mic here). Whitney, the hip, generous minister at St. Aidan's was open and game, so we did it. "Full steam ahead!" Carrie our librarian, Michael Rafferty, Neshama Franklin, and Rob Stewart are some of the locals who generously shared their hearts and lives. So, like a two year old who claps and cries out enthusiastically, "Again!" we are doing another one with some repeat readers (Neshama, Liz Vezzani, Rob), some newbies (Jane Mickelson, Kirk Kirkham), and some surprise guests. Please come and support your friends and neighbors, and keep telling your own stories to anyone who will listen. Who knows, you may be inspired to participate next year for *True Stories* (Take 3)! Reading will be at Saint Aidan's, Sept. 15th, 7pm. Free refreshments. \$5-\$10 suggested donation for show.

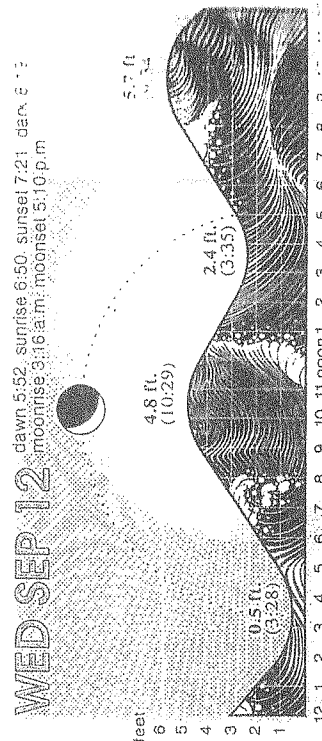
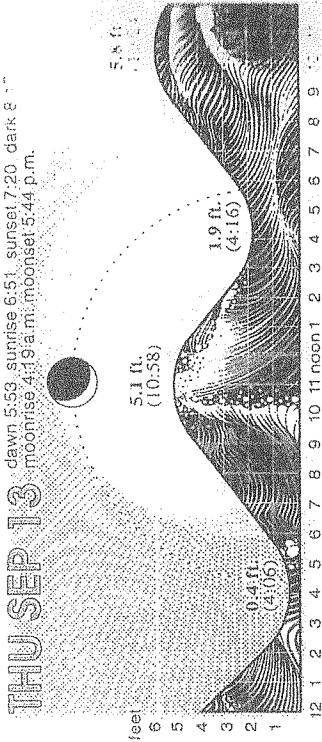
Going Green!:
