Review of Jerry Mander's *The Capitalism Papers, Fatal Flaws of an Obsolete System*

In his recently published book, *The Capitalism Papers, Fatal Flaws of an Obsolete System*, Jerry Mander deconstructs capitalism in a blistering critique. He argues that capitalism functioned relatively well in the US until the early 1900s because there was geographic room to expand and resources were plentiful. But now we have run out of room and we are hitting the limits of unending growth, on which capitalism is based. Can capitalism survive?

He argues that our modern form of corporate capitalism has no other purpose than to maximize profit without considering human welfare or the well-being of the natural world. The result is the devastation of the environment, a propensity towards war to secure natural resources, growing economic inequality within and between countries and the undermining of

democracy as corporations gain greater control of the political process.

He makes a strong point that we can't reform or regulate a system that is fundamentally flawed. But he doesn't reject capitalism altogether. Rather he distinguishes between big, corporate capitalism (Exxon Mobile or Wal-Mart, the two largest companies) from small local capitalism (the Mom and Pop grocery store or Local Savings and Loans), two systems that are so different he suggests that they need different names.

The most common question Jerry is asked is, "So what is the alternative?" His answer is that he doesn't know and doesn't think right now that it's possible to know. Rather, he presents a few ideas that need to be considered in searching for the answer:

- **Nature comes first.** We need to live within the carrying capacity of the Earth in a steady state economy. Old-fashioned values like sufficiency and frugality need to become our future status symbols.

- **Localization.** Economic activity and governance should be achieved at the lowest possible level: local, regional, state and only then, national. Communities need to be mostly self-sufficient in all aspects of the economy.

- **New corporate structures.** New forms of corporations need to be developed that go beyond traditional capitalism or socialism, such as worker-owned cooperatives and B Corporations (no legal obligation to maximize profits).

- **Hybrid economics.** We may need a mixed economy combining traditional free-market private enterprise, centralized planning, state-owned businesses, state-authorized/privately owned businesses and local coops.

I have two main comments. First, it is possible to lay out a more detailed alternative economic system. David Korten has done this in *Agenda for a New Economy* (Berrett Koehler Publishers, 2009), which proposes a Main Street-based rather than a Wall Street-based economy, meaning that business would be mostly decentralized and the existing stock mar-

ket system would be radically modified. His new economy would greatly restrict the power of large corporations to influence economic policy, which liberals should like, and it would reduce government's role in taxation and regulation, which should appeal to conservatives.

Second, what happens with our military system when our existing form of capitalism inevitably collapses? National security spending (including the Pentagon, the nuclear weapons research in the Department of Energy, the Veterans Administration, the CIA and the Department of Homeland Security) currently consumes more than half of all federal discretionary spending, - on the order of \$1.3 trillion out of \$2.1 trillion total. If defense spending were, say, cut in half, we would have to close most of our foreign military bases, significantly reduce spending on weapons development and invade fewer, if any foreign countries. Would we then have our national security pants down or would we don a new set of clothes? I have addressed this topic in my recently pub-

lished *Transition to Peace, a Defense Engineer's Search for an Alternative to War*.

What is certain is that we will need to search for new economic answers in the uncharted waters of the future. The process will almost certainly be messy and painful, but if we begin planning now, the result could be an economy with greater economic equity, less poverty and more happiness in people's lives. Perhaps someday Jerry will be able to write *The Localization Papers, Widely Shared Benefits of a New Economy*.

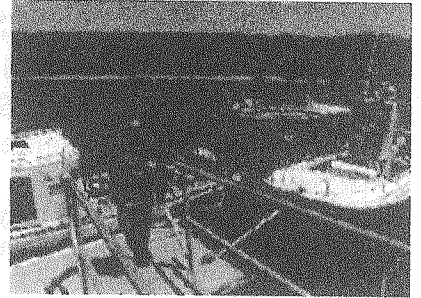

While **Todd Akin's** recent remarks about rape are "not only an insult to our intelligence and a shameful affront to all women in this country," e-mails **Dan Blackwelder**, "the insult and shame that is felt by millions of men has been completely ignored. I am, of course, speaking of the comb-over. I consider it a glaring betrayal to all of us men, when, upon realizing that we're becoming folliclely challenged, sucked it up and did the buzz cut, thus sparing our loved ones and the general public the horror of having to view such an abomination. So to you, Mr. Akin, I say man up, grow a pair, and get rid of that lacquered roadkill on top of your head."

So as long as we're discussing politics (well, sort of), there we were, all danced out, zipped up in our sleeping bags and ready for the sandman, and the folks in the tent next door were sitting on their front deck agreeing vigorously that **Hillary Rodham Clinton** would someday soon make a heck of a president. But it was 2 a.m., and while I may have agreed, I was not so eager to join the discussion.

So I unsnapped the front flap of our Camp Carpe Diem tent and stepped outside — in my red plaid flannels and knitted mukluks, if you must know — to make a friendly and apologetic request for fewer decibels. And there, in peaceful Bolinas, they complied, pleasantly, serenely, strifelessly.

It was that kind of overnight, where the lions (the talkers) and the lambs (the sleepers) lay down together, and love, as honoree and hostess **Susie Buell** put it, was everywhere. "We're living carpe diem," she said.

The occasion was Buell's 70th birthday, at which kids and dogs were welcomed for lunch, dinner and breakfast, where we danced until falling into our cots, where supper featured lamb raised on the pasture where we slept, and where pre-breakfast provisions included shot glasses of mouthwash on counters set up outside the lavish portable bathrooms. Among the guests: **Sid and Nancy Ganis**, **Alice Waters**, Lt. Gov. **Gavin Newsom** and **Jennifer Siebel Newsom**, **Jackson Browne**, **Dale Djerassi**, **Nion McEvoy** and **Leslie Berriman**, **Joshua Robison**, **Stefanie** and **Peter Coyote**, **Stanlee Gatti**, **Orville Schell** and **Liu Baifang**, **Ken Fulk**, **Ryan Phelan** and **Stewart Brand**, **Peggy Knickerbocker** and **Robert Fisher**, an array of members

of the indigenous clans **Fisher** and **Walker**, and many other folks with designer faucets who gamely crossed the pasture for facilities for one night in the country.

Upon arriving, valets took "luggage" up to the tent village on the mesa. These loads included backpacks and starched items on hangers, but L.L. Bean definitely swamped Oscar de la Renta.

Host **Mark Buell**, taking small pleasure in his cigar and large pleasure in sharing the natural splendors of the ranch site, quoted an old Point Reyes Light police report: "A 56-year-old man is feeling exhausted." That got lots of laughs, but no one who was there seemed exhausted at all.

The party had started with lunch on Wednesday, and by the time we arrived in late afternoon, guests were gathered in the Canteen, a common space equipped with books, games, pingpong, billiards, binoculars for bird-watching, an array of camping supplies there for the taking, as well as food and drink. We went on from there to an elegant supper — **Paula LeDuc** did all the catering — at simply laid tables nestled on a hillside near the lagoon, and after that prom- enaded to the Peace Barn for dancing.

There was music everywhere (Sage, Dan Imhoff & Cahoots, This Old Earthquake, the Bill Hopkins Rockn' Orchestra), as well as spoken tributes to the honoree from her two daughters, **Quincy** and **Summer**; from **Michael Tilson Thomas**, who'd written her a syncopated song, mastered that day by the Hopkins group; and from Buell, whose affectionate citation of his wife's wisdom ("LISDIN: Life is short, do it now") was returned by her affectionate tribute to the spouse "who'd only slammed the door once or twice" on her.

Months ago, Buell had said there'd be "no big party" (there were about 200 adult guests and 40 kids), that all she really wanted "was for my granddaughters to learn to whistle like truck drivers." At this, truck driver whistles pierced the air. So she got what she wanted. When we left, at 8 a.m. Wednesday, a bugler was playing reveille. Overnighters felt as though they'd been on vacation for a week; they got what they wanted, too.

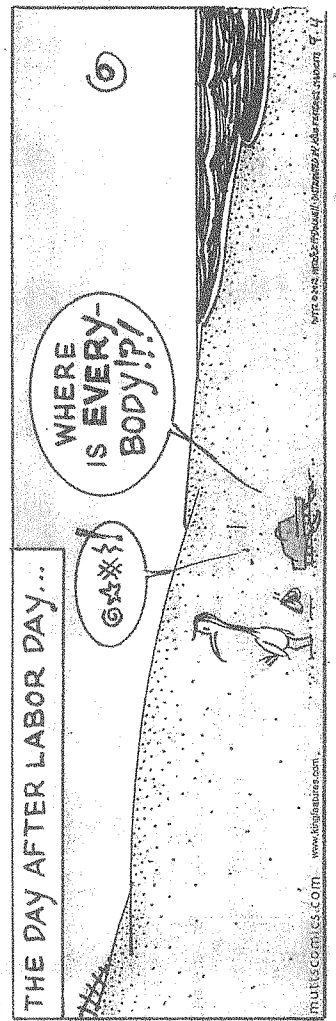

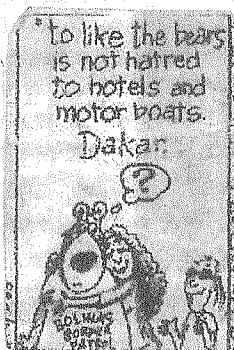

Dear Mr. Ryan:

A belated congratulations on being selected as a candidate for vice president. However, one of your colleagues Representative Todd Akin, is justly reaping his rewards for posting something idiotic and insulting about rape. Your party is justly asking him to step aside. Now, to be not only just and consistent, it's your turn to step down.

Unfair? No. Let me explain -- but I'll keep this brief, as I know you are busy.

You've co-sponsored legislation to make the same sort of absurd distinctions as Akin. Not even *The Onion* could make that sort of thing up. But you and your running mate also pledge to "get rid of" Planned Parenthood, which prevents more abortions than the entire "right to life" movement ever has or will. This all makes no sense, and we need leaders who make sense more than ever, not only to reduce unwanted pregnancies and abortions but to fix a lot of other messes as well.

Even conservative pundit Sean Hannity has joined the call for Akin to step aside, observing that "Sometimes an election is bigger than one person."

Indeed it is. So: Please search your soul, and admit that you too believe what Akin let slip in his moronic remarks. And then, to be consistent, step aside. Many voters, of all political stripes, would think highly of you for that act of candor and courage. You can go back to your old work and enjoy your inherited wealth and privileged Ayn Randian fantasies and keep proposing economic policies which you don't seem to quite grasp yourself -- which is understandable, as those too make little sense.

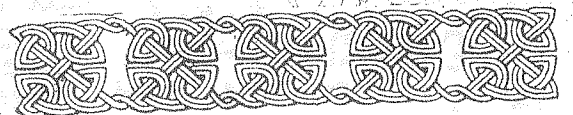

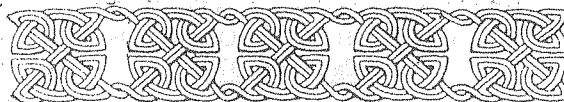
