


WESLA WHITFIELD SINGS THE GREAT AMERICAN SONGBOOK WITH THE MIKE GREENSILL DUO & A

interior design company as an alternative to the mundane.


We now have a second local surf shop operating on Wharf and getting us in the water. There presence means more commuter surfers might actually end up shopping where they play and supporting our local business.

The new environmentalists

Sustainability? That's so 20th century, says Bolinas institute

nvironmental sustainability is not enough. That is a key element in a philosophy that seeks to move beyond maintaining a natural-world status quo, where environmental degradation merely is halted, says Erin O'Reilly, program director at the Regenerative Design Institute in West Marin. "We feel a regenerative system,

something that feeds itself like nature does is the way we need to go. Sustainability is like [saying] we can stay at this same level. -

That's not good enough."

The Regenerative Design Institute is a nexus for the latest permutation of what in the 1960s was called the environmental movement. Actually, the institute is on a branch of a family tree that stretches back to President Theodore Roosevelt, a preservationist whose most important and lasting environmental contribution was the creation of the system of national forests, parks, monuments and other ecological milestones. Although principally a preservationist, Roosevelt acknowledged that humans live in the natural world and interact with nature. He believed that people should be conscious of environmental consequences.

"In utilizing and considering the natural resources of the nation," Roosevelt said in an address in Jamestown, Virginia, in 1907, "the one characteristic more essential than

any other is foresight The conservation of our natural resources and their proper use constitute the fundamental problem which underlies almost every other problem of our national life."

Given the changes caused by human activity in the years since that speech, Roosevelt's admonition has more import now than it did when he first spoke those words. Problems caused by carbon emissions, greenhouse gases, sea-level rise and climate change are all current consequences Roosevelt could hardly have envisioned as the result of a technological march into the future. Or maybe he was prescient. In 1907, in an address to the Deep Waterway Convention, he said that unless the nation could successfully meet the challenge of solving the problems related to conservation of hatural resources, "it will avail us little to solve all [problems]."

Although Roosevelt is known as a conservationist, his motivation centered on preserving resources. The conservation movement came along after Roosevelt, essentially taking his environmental baton. Skip to Rachel Carson and work such as the 1962 publication Silent Spring, which warned about environmental contamination, and a new dawn of the environmental movement unfolds. Carson, who was born the same year Roosevelt gave those talks, often is called the mother of - Full story online at PacificSun.com


Drawing Crowds: Touring the Tiny Enigmatic Berg of Bolinas

Quirky locals, moneyed artists and zen surfers populate a secluded beachside community


This week Drawing Crowds went to a wedding in Bolinas, a tiny wind-swept community in Marin with a reputation for being clannish. Graphic reviewer Jay Sacher found the quirky place to be both welcoming and guarded at the same time.

The only thing I'd heard about Bolinas, the hippy-dippy soul-surfer community nestled along the lagoon north of Stinson Beach, is that the locals are not fond of outsiders. Whether that's true or not I cannot say. In town this past weekend for a friend's wedding, I encountered a few stares, but most often cheerful smiles and accommodating friendliness. I witnessed none of the oft-discussed stories of misplaced street signs (to confuse out-of-towners) and while I did take extra care to tread softly through the town, Bolinas seemed content enough to have me there.




At Smiley's Schooner Saloon along Bolinas' main strip, bar was tended by a chipper young woman and her pork-pie hatted compatriot, a guy named Donkey. Saturday afternoon found the tavern packed with a busload full of drunken post-college maniacs: a man in pajama pants quite vocally distressed by the Giants loss to the Brewers, an elegant blonde playing pool with a couple in matching Giants jerseys, a drunken girl with a triangle painted on her forehead, and this guy, sweaty and glassy-eyed, engaging in a string of animated conversations with the smokers on Smiley's front porch.

We walked the loop through town and down to the wind-swept beach. Surfer mom and dads waxed their longboards, their children threw globs of muddy sand at one another.

The beach is sprinkled with street art. Graffiti of birds, aliens, art-forward slogans and stencils of Barbarella brandishing a surfboard.



The wedding was two miles from town, in a sprawling hippy mansion whose original proprietress, a hard-nosed patron of the arts, had passed away last year. Her son, who lives on the property, recently began renting it out for events. After the wedding, I leafed through the proprietresses' scrapbooks, left out for guests to perusa. With frank detail, she chronicles her life of privilege and her rebellion from that privilege that led her from the beatnik dens of the West Village to the town of Bolinas and her one-of-a-kind home. It seemed a fitting portrait of this strange little community—part playground for moneyed artists, part zen surfer tramp paradise, part welcoming, part secluded. It's a town that's shy about itself, but hardly humble—it's San Francisco in ministure.

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
